

Groves Asks Production Of Atomic

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)— Maj. Gen. L. R. Groves told the senate atomic energy committee today he considers it necessary to continue making atomic bombs until we have a suitable supply on hand and the question of international control is determined.

It should be possible to make certain reductions in the plants within two years, the head of the secret Manhattan project told Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.). Until then, Groves said, the production facilities should be retained and operated about as they now stand.

He testified that budget estimates for peacetime operation had not been prepared, but rather reluctantly estimated that the expense would run somewhat less than \$500,000,000 a year.

His testimony before the senate group studying control measures included these other points:

1. A recommendation for establishment of a special commission independent of any other government agency to supervise and control the development of atomic energy.
 2. Official casualty estimates of the two atomic bombings of Japan: 70,000 to 120,000 dead or missing and 75,000 to 200,000 injured at Hiroshima; 40,000 to 45,000 dead or missing and 40,000 injured at Nagasaki.
 3. A declaration that the atomic bomb was "the greatest surprise since the Trojan horse" and effective in bringing the Japanese war to a sudden end.
 4. A statement that no radioactive damage was done to human beings except at the moment the bomb went off.
 5. An estimate that if an atomic bomb were dropped in the "federal triangle" of government buildings in Washington, an area about two miles in diameter would be destroyed.
- Such an area would take in the capitol and the White House, range northwest as far as the National Cathedral, and windows would be blown out of the Pentagon building across the Potomac river in Virginia, he said.

Amery To Hang For Treachery

LONDON, Nov. 28 (AP)— John Amery, son of a former secretary of state for India, was sentenced to death today after he pleaded guilty to charges of high treason and treachery. The entire proceedings took only six minutes.

Amery, 33, was the second former German propaganda broadcaster to receive the death sentence. William Joyce, "Lord Haw Haw," previously was convicted of high treason and sentenced to be hanged.

Clad in a long brown overcoat and green silk scarf, Amery leaned forward expressionless, and clutched the edge of the dock as he told Justice Humphreys: "I plead guilty to all counts."

Asked by the clerk if he could give any reason why the court should not pronounce the sentence of death, Amery replied with a firm "No." He added, "No thanks," when the judge asked if he wished to make a final statement.

The judge then passed sentence. Amery bowed low, turned sharply and walked without faltering down the stone steps leading to the old Bailey cells.

Amery was accused of having been selected by the Germans to head a provisional British government after the projected invasion and of having said that \$1,200,000 was placed at his disposal for this purpose by an English committee composed of "anti-Jewish interests."

Pulp Strike To Be Talked

TACOMA, Nov. 28 (AP)— Re-opening of negotiations between manufacturers in the Pacific coast pulp and paper industry and two American Federation of Labor unions employed in the industry who are seeking a wage increase, was announced today by John Sherman, representing the unions.

Sherman said a negotiating conference between the unions, which are the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers and the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers, and the Pacific Coast Association of Pulp and Paper Manufacturers has been arranged to take place at Portland, December 8.

All locals of the unions in Washington, Oregon and California, are being notified to send representatives, Sherman said.

Negotiations between employers and the unions broke off last May, and the dispute was referred to the war labor board.

The board brought down a decision which the unions turned down as unsatisfactory by a vote of their membership a week ago.

The chief jumping off place for tactical, cargo and passenger planes headed for Europe during the war was Presque Island, Maine.

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Price Bares Conditions In Germany

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)— The White House made public today a recommendation by Byron Price for re-examination of the entire basic structure of military government in Germany, including the Potsdam declaration.

"We must decide whether we are going to permit starvation, with attendant epidemics and disorders, in the American zone, or ship the food to prevent it," said the former censorship director who investigated conditions in Germany at the request of President Truman.

Mr. Truman, in a brief statement accompanying Price's report said it "is worthy of the most careful consideration."

The chief executive requested the war, state and navy departments to give "careful consideration" to his recommendations, most of which Price discussed with newspapermen in an interview recently.

The report amplifies Price's assertion that as a result of the French attitude, "Germany is not being treated as an economic unit," but is being handled in a way that virtually amounts to "its economic dismemberment."

Deadlock

"The necessity of breaking the present deadlock in the control council in Berlin is so important that use of the full force and prestige of American diplomatic power to that end is fully warranted," Price declared.

"Repeated attempts have been made to set up common policies so that the German railways, the German postal service and other essential facilities could be operated as integral national systems. All of these attempts have failed, due almost entirely to the rigid opposition of the French."

If France is bent on dismemberment of Germany, Price said, "she should be made to acknowledge that policy before the world and not permit it to hide behind the opposite pronouncements of the Potsdam declaration."

He added that "our own policies should then be re-examined accordingly."

A Milwaukie resident, he has lived in Oregon for three years and operates a Portland night club-restaurant.

SEATTLE, Nov. 28 (AP)— A total of 231 temporary family dwellings, 864 dormitory units and 50 trailers have been made available to nine Pacific northwest educational institutions to care for student veterans and their families, Jesse Epstein, regional director of the federal public housing authority, said today. They include: Oregon State college, University of Washington, 52 temporary units and 864 dormitory units, and Eastern Washington college of education, 50 trailers.
