

Marines Drop Game To Astoria

Leathernecks Unable To Hit Hoop In Losing 48 to 34

 The marines weren't able to hit the basket enough times last night against the Astoria Navy Flyers and dropped their second straight game, 48-34, on the barracks basketball court.

In the opening seconds of the initial half the Flyers looped in one score, then the marines scored a couple to take a two-point lead and be out in front, 4-2, the only time the leathernecks were ahead all evening.

Astoria has a 6-foot-5 center, Mattson, who very nearly took the game into his own hands at this point, pushing the navy into a lead which was never threatened seriously.

Mattson was tall enough to have control of the rebounds at both ends of the court and the leathernecks rarely ever had a chance for a tip-in shot while he was in the game.

The first half of the game was close-called by Referee Joe La-Clair and the leathernecks missed numerous chances behind the hoop.

The second half of the game was steadily dropped back under the Flyers' steady scoring until they were 10 points behind in the middle of the period. Suddenly starting a rally that brought them to within two goals of knotting the count, the marines began to get the range of the hoop on their long throws and also momentarily had command of the rebounds.

Adams flipped in a long toss, McCulloch got one off the backboard, Adams heaved in another from far out at an angle and Vermont scored from the same spot.

The rally died prematurely, however, and the navy stalled for time a couple of minutes, then rang up 10 more tallies in quick order to end the game, 48-34.

Weichlein got 12 points for Astoria and Mattson and Woods hit 11 each. For the leathernecks Neff scored nine and Vermont and Adams six each. Neff, playing the second half, went out of the game on five fouls.

The refereeing loosened up during the second half and the game got wilder by the minute. The two teams went together for the final game of their series on the barracks hardwood at 8 o'clock tonight. All cage fans are invited to attend free of charge.

100,000 Fans Will Witness USC-UCLA Tilt

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29 (AP)—Only 500 reserved seats remain to be sold to pack the Coliseum with 100,000 customers for the Saturday game in which the Southern California Trojans will trot out every pigskin trick they know in an attempt to squelch the UCLA Bruins and clinch a Rose Bowl bid.

Arnold Eddy, Southern California's graduate manager, said 10,000 seats will be held for service men on a first come, first served basis.

If the Trojans win or tie there is no doubt that the Pacific coast conference members will designate them to meet Alabama in Pasadena New Year's Day. A UCLA victory would knock Southern California out of the Bowl race and probably give the bid to Washington State. However an overwhelming victory by the Bruins might swing the conference vote and give the Bruins the Bowl nomination.

Two other Navy regulars, End Leon Bramlett and Tackle Bo Coppedge, have shoulder injuries but Hagberg said they will "be in there Saturday."
