

# 3 Issues Talked By Congress

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—Congress drove deeper today into the questions of atomic power, an army-navy merger, Pearl Harbor.

Purely domestic affairs took a back seat, although the house bill was stirred up about flood control.

This was the situation: Maj. Gen. L. R. Groves said America can stay ahead of all other countries — for all time to come — in making atomic bombs — if they all work in secrecy. The boss of the bomb project spoke to the senate atomic committee.

H. Struve Hensel, assistant secretary of the navy, accused the war department of muzzling thought and ordering officers to follow a "military party line" for an army-navy merger. He appeared before the senate military committee. The navy is against a merger.

Pearl Harbor investigators had a look at Army intelligence estimates of Japan's plans in the months before the attack on Hawaii.

A message from Washington dated three days before Japan attacked Hawaii, telling naval attaches in Japan and parts of China to destroy codes.

Admiral Harold R. Stark, chief of naval operations, sent the message. Admiral Husband E. Kimmel, commander of the Pacific fleet at Pearl Harbor, was marked in for a copy.

Chairman Barkley (D-Ky.) announced that the investigating committee definitely would hear Gen. George C. Marshall before he takes off for Chungking to be American ambassador to China.

**FERRY DAMAGED**  
CANBY, Nov. 29 (AP)—Flood waters tore the Canby ferry loose from its moorings during the recent storm, and the craft may be out of commission for several months, the county court said today.

# Marine General Lauds Marshall

CHUNGKING, Nov. 29 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, U. S. commander in China, told newsmen today that he thought General Marshall was being sent to China "to make a survey of the situation and make appropriate recommendations to the president concerning future U. S. assistance—or military aid—to China."

"Few men in the United States, either military or civilian, are better equipped to evaluate a situation than General Marshall. He has a fund of experience in international affairs, and enjoys the respect of the president, congress and the people of the United States," Wedemeyer added.

**Lindy Bagged Japanese Planes**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—Rep. Mason (R-Ill.) reported today that Charles A. Lindbergh shot down several Japanese planes while testing army fighters as a civilian.

Mason inserted a statement in the congressional record which said: "Ford took Lindbergh on (as a civilian expert) in spite of White House opposition and Lindbergh went to the Southwest Pacific to test war planes under actual combat conditions."

"In demonstration test flights—as a technical civilian advisor to our fighting forces—he actually shot down several enemy planes, all of course off the record because he was a civilian and noncombatant."

"Thus did this 43-year-old civilian flier, far beyond the regular age of army fighter pilots, demonstrate what fighter planes could do under actual combat conditions."

EUGENE, Nov. 29 (AP)—Ernest Haycox, Portland author, and Ralph Cornice, publisher of the Albany Democrat-Herald, were nominated today for presidency of the University of Oregon Alumni association.

Voting will be by mail during December.

# Rogue Valley Crops Worth \$20,000,000

MEDFORD, Nov. 29 (AP)—The gross value of agricultural and horticultural crops of the Rogue river valley this year was \$20,000,000, County Agent R. G. Fowler estimated today.

The total represents a 25 per cent increase over last year. Value of the pear crop was

between \$10,000,000 and \$11,000,000, Fowler said. He attributed the 25 per cent increase in the pear crop value to a record crop and higher buying prices.

**SCALDED TO DEATH**  
PORTLAND, Nov. 29 (AP)—Death of a Portland woman who fell into a bath tub and was scalded was reported by police today.

Officers said Mrs. Roy O. Wilson, 49, apparently struck her head against a hotwater faucet, the blow turning the water on and knocking her unconscious.

# Yetman Will Direct USO

Ruth Glasgow, who has directed the local USO club since August 1, 1945, will turn over her post to Hal A. Yetman, who will be the new director after December 8.

Mrs. Glasgow plans to accompany her husband, Robert Glasgow, recently discharged from the army, and her daughter to New York City where Mr. and Mrs. Glasgow will attend Columbia university. She has been in USO work for three years, and with the Salvation Army USO since June, 1944.

The new director has served since January, 1942, with the USO in San Diego. He has had 20 years of experience in YMCA work in the East.

Mrs. Glasgow plans to give up USO work completely. "I very much hate to leave Klamath Falls and my work with the USO, but I'm eager to go back to housekeeping. Klamath Falls has been an ideal set-up for the USO," she stated.

# Power Shortage May Close Fish Canneries

NEWPORT, Nov. 29 (AP)—Shortage of power due to closure of the lumber mill at Toledo may force four fish canneries to close from 5 to 8 p. m. daily, during the day's consumption peak.

Canneries affected will be the Yaquina Bay Fish company, New English Fish company, Waldport Seafood company and Columbia River Packers association.

**1200 Navy Men Due To Arrive In U. S.**  
PORTLAND, Nov. 29 (AP)—About 1200 navy men are scheduled to arrive here today aboard the transports Dithda and Bracken.

The vessels had not passed the Astoria lightship at 7 a. m., however, when they were scheduled to reach the mouth of the Columbia river.

# Coos Bay Water Faucets Dry Again

COOS BAY, Ore., Nov. 29 (AP)—Coos Bay water faucets were dry again today—but engineers hoped to get the water running by tonight.

A storm-pounded reservoir which broke Tuesday was temporarily repaired last evening. Today another cave-in shut off the water supply again.

Housewives have been catching rain in dishpans and filling jugs from emergency carloads of water. About 10,000 persons here and in adjoining North Bend were affected.

# Fishing Boats Unable To Leave Harbors

NEWPORT, Nov. 29 (AP)—It will be several days before many fishing boats are able to leave Newport and Toledo, a check of storm damage to the fleets showed today.

Heaviest damage was at inland Toledo, where skippers, believing their boats safe, took less precautions. The pounding together of the vessels twisted rudders and stove in some planking, causing leakage.

# Labor Parley OK's Lewis Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—The labor-management conference today adopted the suggestion of John L. Lewis to make its decisions subject to unanimous approval.

CIO President Philip Murray, who has tangled with the United Mine Workers' president of almost every issue in the conference meetings, supported the Lewis proposal.

President Eric Johnston of the U. S. chamber of commerce, commenting on the Murray-Lewis cooperation, said the management side was pleased at the sight of "the lion and the lamb lying down together."

# Portland Military Posts Almost Vacant

PORTLAND, Nov. 29 (AP)—Empty beds were conspicuous today at this area's army and navy intake centers for men en route home for discharge—a marked contrast with last week-end's overcrowded conditions.

The navy center at Swan Island had 2481 sailors, but capacity for 5500. Vancouver Barracks, with the same capacity, reported only 300 men.
