

Rose Bowl Hosts Decided Tomorrow

100,000 Will See Trojans Take On UCLA At Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 30 (AP)—With one foot in the Rose Bowl, the Southern California Trojans meet the UCLA Bruins tomorrow in the "crucial" of the Pacific coast football season before a near sell-out crowd of 100,000 in Memorial coliseum.

A win or a tie puts the Trojans in the Rose Bowl for the third straight time. A Bruin win probably will send Washington State to the Pasadena saucer, although if UCLA should win by a two-touchdown or better margin a lot of important people might be influenced to vote the Bruins into the bowl in tomorrow night's telegraphic poll of Coast conference members.

Missouri Will Play Texas In Cotton Bowl

DALLAS, Nov. 30 (AP)—The University of Missouri has been granted permission by the Big Six to play in the Cotton Bowl against the University of Texas here January 1, Sam Shirky, chairman of the athletic commission of the University of Missouri, told Dan D. Rogers, chairman of the Cotton Bowl board here today.

The University of Missouri Tigers had been extended an invitation to play in the Cotton Bowl and had accepted pending approval of other members of the Big Six conference.

Shirky notified Rogers today that the approval had been given, and the Tigers would meet the Longhorns here.

Texas was automatically named the Cotton Bowl host team yesterday when it defeated Texas A&M 20-10 at College Station. Immediately after the game, Texas accepted the bowl invitation.

ARMY 27-POINT FAVORITES

An underdog but undaunted Navy team takes on the fearsome job tomorrow of trying to stop Army's mighty eleven in the 46th game between the service academies—a rivalry that started in 1890.

President Truman, the cadet corps and the midshipmen brigade will be among more than 100,000 spectators in Municipal stadium when Navy's unbeaten and one-tied team goes up against the wondrous West Pointers who have a record of 17 consecutive triumphs.

The rival service eleven, headquarters in suburban country clubs, were to hold tight practice drills today on the stadium turf which has been under tarpaulin as protection from rain the past two days and last night's snow. The weatherman foresees fair, cold weather for the game.

Army's string of victories, plus the fact that none of its opponents this year had scored a point by rushing through the Cadets' varyly line were reasons why Col. Earl Bank's Mole-skinners ruled a 27-point favorite.

Army has scored touchdowns and won games in a much-as-its-pleased manner except for about 13 minutes in the game against Notre Dame, when the Ramblers, trailing by seven points,

pushed the Cadets around but couldn't contrive a score. Michigan passed to a touchdown against the Army varsity, and Duke tallied 13 points against a mixture of second and third team players.

Navy had to stage fourth-quarter rallies to gain a 6-6 tie with Notre Dame and a 14-6 victory over Pennsylvania. Army whipped these opponents 48 to 0 and 61 to 0, respectively.

In all, the service teams met five mutual opponents this season, Villanova, Duke, Michigan, Notre Dame and Penna. Army rolled up 239 points against them and gave up 20, while Navy scored 123 points and yielded 19.

The job cut out for the Navy is to find a way to shackle Army's touchdown twins, Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard, who have crossed enemy goal lines 16 times a piece this season, they're swift, durable and versatile, and both can run through the line or sweep the ends.

Marines Get 39-38 Edge On Astoria

Leathernecks Overcome 14-Point Deficit In Gaining Initial Win

Trailing by 14 points late in the second half, the Marines rallied at a two-points-per-minute clip to edge out the Astoria Navy Flyers 39-38 on the barracks maple court last night.

The win was the first of the cage season for the leathernecks after a pair of losses. The Flyers led last night's tilt all the way through until the Marines finally hit a clicking combination in Vermont Neff, Slimak, Lynch and Lambert.

Neff, starting forward, was easily the classiest player on the floor during the second half. Woods, Navy guard, played the first half as though he was out for a new scoring record, getting five of Astoria's first seven goals. He made 15 points in the first half and was held to only two in the second for a total of 17.

Art Verment tallied 14 for the Marines.

With Astoria boys, using a lightning fast break, ran the Marines ragged during the initial half, flashing the full length of the court for most of their tallies. Their passing was superb while the leatherneck ball handlers had pass after pass blocked.

The Navy defense kept the Marines shooting from a distance during this half, but Vermont managed to get the range on one-hand angle shots and the half ended with Astoria ahead, 27-16.

The first few minutes of the second half were slow, neither team getting close enough for accurate shooting. Suddenly the leathernecks' man-to-man defense broke wide open and the Flyers ran the score up to 36-22.

With seven minutes to go, the Marines caught fire. Neff, hanging under the basket, saved several shots by tip-ins. Vermont plunked in a couple of long throws and a pair of charity losses brought the count to 36-34. Lambert hit a free throw for a point. Slimak put the Marines ahead with a goal from the left of the basket and scored again from an angle to give the leathernecks a three-point lead with three minutes to play.

From then on it was stall and hold the ball for the Marines. Astoria tried desperately to salvage the game, shooting wild and off-balance, but could get only one basket, a one-hand push by Mattson.

The game ended with the Marines in possession of the ball, 39-38.
