The plant has only enough sawdust to run 50 to 75 per cent of the time. It was sending out heat this morning, but planned to stop at noon.

# Copco Puts In Water Main

A new water main extension is being built at South 8th and Logan in Klamath Falls by the California-Oregon Power company. During the month of December, 2000 feet of 4 and 6-inch cast iron pipe will be laid, and work will be finished on the project before the first of the year.

The new extension is being built at the request of property holders in that district who formerly have used private wells for their water supply. Approximately 15 new domestic water users will be added when the main is completed.

Copco men are at work on their routine job of tree trimming in the vicinity of N. 8th, where tree tops are interfering with the power lines. Property holders have been notified by the city to trim their trees to free the power lines, in accordance with a city ordinance to that effect.

# Pork Shortage, Blamed On High Feed Costs, To Get Worse Before Better

"I'll Have Ham On Rye"

The accompanying luscious, mouth-watering picture doesn't mean a thing! The hams, right fresh from the smokehouse, couldn't be bought for love nor money and you and I will go right on yearning for pork for a long time to come. These hams happen to be custom-cured.

Lucky is the housewife who hits the butcher shop at the right time when a stray porker hits the cutting block.

The pork situation was termed "difficult" by two packing houses today. One packer said it gets a "lot worse before it gets any better," and only when hog raisers bring in the animals now and then is there any pork for local consumption. The old story, feed too high to put into the animals, was repeated by both packing houses as the lack of pork foods including hams, bacon, loins, roasts or pigs' feet.

There won't be any hams or bacon for the holiday season unless you happen to be lucky and are having your own cured. With the points removed from all meats, more city dwellers were scouring the country looking for hogs which they could have custom killed and cured for their own tables. One packing house reported some 800 pieces of pork cured this week for private use. It takes about two weeks to properly cure hams or bacon slabs.

The pork forecast wasn't rosy. Slaughterers said it would take about one year from the time that hog raisers started in again, before marketable animals would be available. The middle west market was reported better than the Pacific coast market, but even in the corn belt they weren't getting much work out and western shipments were not sufficient to meet the demand.

Not unless they belong to you, you won't. These hams, fresh from Bratton's smokehouse, are being checked for the customers by Roe Ryckman. They are a part of the custom cured meats which will go to Klamath Falls but are not available over the counter.

# Four Shiploads Of Spuds Move

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 — Four shiploads of potatoes under the deal by which the department of agriculture sold one million bushels to Belgium, have been cleared during the past 10 days, totalling approximately 1200 carloads of potatoes in the four cargoes. Terms of the Belgium contract call for shipment of the entire one million bushels prior to the end of November but it is anticipated that extension of time will be granted for moving the balance due to Belgium.

The cargo vessels carrying the potatoes cleared from Portland, Me., with a fifth ship reported as standing by for loading at Providence, R. I.
