

Publisher Speaks At BPW Meeting

"The United States, whether we like it or not, has to step out and take the leadership of the world. There can no longer be any such thing as isolationism," declared Frank Jenkins, publisher of The Herald-News, when he told of his observations and impressions of postwar Europe at one of the largest meetings ever held of the Business and Professional Women's club on Monday evening, November 26, at the Willard hotel.

Mr. Jenkins described the complete destruction of Berlin, the flourishing black markets, the terrific inflation, the hatred toward Americans on the continent, the friendliness in England where "our boys" mingled with the British, living in their homes.

Most nearly expressing the absolute chaos in which Europe finds itself today, was Mr. Jenkins' statement that Europe is back to where it was at the end of the Dark Ages.

Introducing the speaker was Dena Backes who served as program chairman, assisted by members of the educational committee, Augusta Parker, Stella Bowne, Charlotte Marshall, Esther Lawler and Lucille Willis.

In keeping with this year's slogan of BPW, Mrs. Marshall of the U. S. employment office, gave a brief history on employment and the aims of this federal service for the future and for assisting returned veterans.

Esther Lawler of the Klamath County chamber of commerce, in another short talk, brought the job situation down to cases and stated that the situation in this county in regard to women workers is very good.

This affair is sponsored this year by the League of Women Voters, and Prof. L. B. Prillaman of Portland will be the guest speaker, discussing international relations.

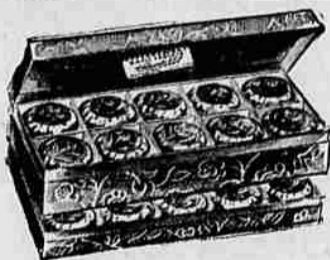
