

Four Manila Youths Stage Bank Robbery

MANILA, Dec. 4 (AP)—Four Manila youths armed with a sub-machinegun staged the biggest bank robbery in Philippine history today and were captured eight hours later with 399,000 pesos (\$199,500) of the 430,000-peso haul.

Police were searching for the 31,000 pesos (\$15,500) still missing.

Col. J. P. Holland, provost marshal and Manila police chief, said the four roared up in a jeep just as two messengers were leaving the Philippine Bank of Communications, one of the largest in Manila.

They pulled out U. S. army pistols and a sub-machinegun, forced the messengers to hand over the money and sped away.

Sharp-eyed witnesses later spotted the jeep and a one-armed youth they said was a member of the gang and tipped off U. S. army authorities.

Military police closed in quickly and surrounded the four in a house in the suburb of Santa Ana. The suspects surrendered without firing a shot. A fifth man was arrested as a suspected accomplice.

Professor Says Some Atomic Bombs In U.S.

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 4 (AP)—Dr. Linus Pauling, head of the chemistry department at California Institute of Technology, says between 100 and 200 atomic bombs, all of the "small" variety, are now in existence in the United States.

The professor, addressing a conference last night of the Hollywood independent citizens committee of arts, sciences and professions, said there is no reason to believe that there may not be 100 or 200 atomic bombs in this country by next year. He said larger bombs than those now developed will be made.

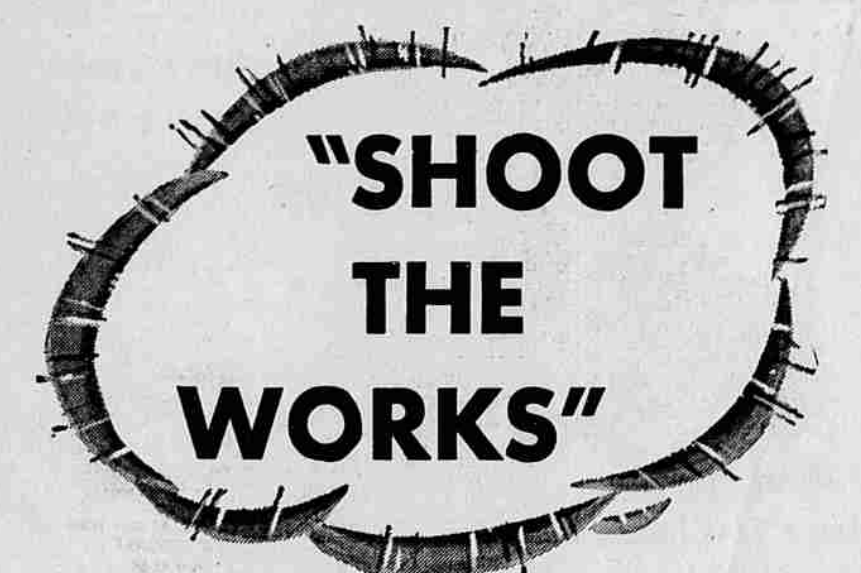

PORTLAND, Dec. 4 (AP)—Sales to individuals in Oregon's Victory Loan drive have reached \$37,490,000—94.9 per cent of quota, the state war finance committee said today.

E bond sales of only \$90,000 yesterday brought that figure to \$12,350,000, or 54.9 per cent of the goal.

26 Diet Members War Criminals

TOKYO, Dec. 4 (AP)—The diet, with 26 members named on General MacArthur's latest list of wanted war criminal suspects, was portrayed today by one member as feeling "as if an incendiary big shell has dropped on a neighbor's house."

Under such a cloud, the nation's gloomy financial situation was discussed only half-heartedly. The diet heard yesterday that heavy tax increases are ahead.

Kyodo News agency quoted Finance Minister Keizo Shibusawa as saying the government has decided to reimburse investors for the loss of Japanese assets estimated at approximately 110,000,000,000 yen (about \$7,000,000,000) in Manchuria, China, Korea, Formosa, Sakhalin and Southern Pacific areas.

Presumably all Japanese assets abroad are to be seized for reparations.

Pilot Sights Missing Plane

NOME, Alaska, Dec. 4 (AP)—Army planes and local fliers were searching for Pilot Don George of Ferguson Airways at Kotzebue, whose last radioed words to his home base were "I don't know where I am, I have to go down."

George, flying with a mail load, messaged last Wednesday that he was off his course and thought he was about two hours flying time north of Nome.

Snow and cold weather have impeded the search.

Later Pilot Gene Jack of Kotzebue radioed he had sighted the wreckage on the side of a hill and the plane was so badly wrecked there probably was no chance George was still alive.

He had been on the direct course between Deering and Candle and a few more minutes' flight would have taken him to a safe landing on level sea ice.

Search parties were to attempt to reach the scene today.

Wallgren Commutes Death Sentence

OLYMPIA, Dec. 4 (AP)—Gov. Mon C. Wallgren today commuted to life imprisonment a death sentence for Mrs. Blanche Patton, 60, Tacoma, forestalling what would have been the first execution of a woman in the history of the state of Washington.

Mrs. Patton, frail and crippled since childhood as a result of infantile paralysis, was scheduled to be hanged at the state penitentiary at Walla Walla January 3, 1946, for the "butcher knife" slaying of Fred Stone, 63, last July 1 at a Tacoma nursing home.

Air Policies Board Talked

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—Creation of a nine-member board to establish national air policies was proposed in a bill by Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.).

The bill would require the board to work out procedures to stimulate a healthy rate of technical progress in air transportation; to coordinate military and naval air forces and government agencies concerned with aviation and transportation; establish the size of peacetime air forces necessary to the national defense; provide for maintenance of a properly balanced productive capacity of aircraft in peacetime; determine to what extent, if any, plans for future war time expansion should rely upon peacetime aircraft production companies and the extent to which this expansion should involve conversion of the automobile or other non-aircraft industries.

Plane Makes Paris Flight

PARIS, Dec. 4 (AP)—The Paris Sky Chief, instituting a new commercial route for Transcontinental and Western Airlines, landed at Orly field at 1:35 a. m. PST today after a flight of 14 hours 47 minutes elapsed time from Washington, which included stops at Gander, Newfoundland, and Shannon airport, Ireland.

Passengers on the big Constellation-type plane included Postmaster General Robert Hannegan, Senator Edward Robertson (R-Wyo.), Rep. Clarence Lea (D-Calif.), Rep. Clarence Cannon (D-Mo.), and Francis La

Coste, French minister plenipotentiary.

The flight was the forerunner of regular TWA service to Europe and the Middle East. A company spokesman said regular flights to Paris probably would start by Dec. 20, with extensions to Cairo soon afterward.
