

# Reds Refuse To Permit Additional Iranian Troops Into Azerbaijan

TEHRAN, Dec. 5 (AP)—The Russians have refused, in a second note to the Iranian government, to permit entrance of additional Iranian troops into the troubled northwestern province of Azerbaijan, it was disclosed today.

The new Soviet note came during a tense political situation, with Iranian Premier Hakkim threatening to resign unless the dispute over the province was settled by direct negotiation with Moscow.

## Solons Urge More Aid To War Victims

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—The senate turned today to further relief for victims of war after voting, 65 to 7, for active participation in the peace-seeking United Nations organization.

Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.) planned to step down from the presiding officer's rostrum to try for speedy approval of a \$550,000 UNRRA appropriation. It is the final installment of this country's original pledge to the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration.

The house weeks ago approved the last installment and today opened debate on a second \$1,350,000 pledge.

McKellar well past the dinner hour last night banged his gavel on senate passage of the UNO bill setting up machinery for this country's active role in the infant organization. The measure now goes to the house where Chairman Bloom (D-N.Y.) of the foreign affairs committee told reporters he hoped for final passage before the December 20 holiday recess.

A UNO organization meeting is scheduled in London next month. Senate passage found only one democrat, Senator Wheeler (Mont.) and six republicans, Senators Langer (N.D.), Moore (Okla.), Revercomb (W. Va.), Shipstead (Minn.), Taft (Ohio), and Wherry (Neb.) voting "no" on the final roll call.

Wheeler protested that the legislation would give any president power to involve this country in war without approval of congress or the public. "I do not want to jeopardize the lives of Americans," the westerner said as he and Senator Willis (R-Ind.) urged an amendment that would require the president to go to congress each time American troops were asked by the UNO security council to halt aggressors. The senate rejected this 65 to 9.

As passed the bill requires the president to get congressional approval only on the numbers and types of troops. These then could be used by UNO for any emergency.

Iranian troops, ordered to the province which is the scene of a local autonomy movement, were bivouacked at Shahr-e Kord, where they were halted Nov. 20, by the Russians. Soviet troops have occupied the province since 1941, when they were sent to guard the Russian lease supply lane.

The new Russian note, dated Dec. 2 and delivered by the Soviet embassy in Tehran, said: "The Soviet embassy in Iran presents its compliments to the Iranian ministry of foreign affairs and in answer to its notes dated Nov. 20 and Nov. 22 declares that, concerning the request of the Iranian ministry for immediate Soviet authorization for Iranian troops to move northwards, the Soviet embassy reiterates that it has given its definite answer in the note of Nov. 26."

In the Nov. 26 note the Russians said their refusal was

based upon the opinion that the arrival of Iranian government troops in the province would provoke bloodshed.

**Suggestion Rejected**  
Both the United States and Britain have dispatched notes to Moscow on the situation, the United States suggesting withdrawal of all allied occupation troops from Iran, the British urging that Iranian troops be given freedom of movement. The Russians were reported to have rejected the suggestion for withdrawal of allied occupation troops by Jan. 1.

The original Soviet note to the Iranian government said that should bloodshed break out in Azerbaijan because of the arrival of government troops, "The Soviet government would be forced to bring additional troops to Iran for their troops' protection. Since the Soviet government does not wish to send more troops to Iran, they do not deem it wise for further Iranian troops to be sent to the north province."

## Price Accepts Film Position

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Byron Price, veteran newsman and former censorship director, has accepted the vice presidency of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America. He will be in charge of the Hollywood branch of what used to be called "The Hayes office," until Eric Johnston succeeds Will Hays as president of the organization.

In announcing the appointment last night Johnston said Price will supervise research to improve techniques and "toward wider use of the film; extension of the use of motion pictures in education and in training; and development of enlightened labor-management relations."

**Good Salary**  
The job was offered earlier to J. A. Krug, former chairman of the war production board, who declined it. Johnston said then the salary offer was \$75,000 a year.

Price, who is 54, went to work with United Press in 1912, when he was graduated from Wabash college in his home state of Indiana. He joined the Associated Press the same year.

He was Washington bureau chief for ten years and had become AP executive news editor when he was granted a leave of absence in December, 1941, to act as censorship director in Washington.

He went to Europe last September as President Truman's representative to study conditions in occupied countries. His report, urging particularly changes in occupation policy in Germany, was made public by the White House last week.
