Klamath Falls Men Drawn For Federal Jury

Grand and trial jurors, reporting to Medford at the federal district court, December 5 and 7, included a number of Klamath men. The list was released by the United States marshal at Portland.

Drawn for the grand jury to report today, Wednesday, were Charles A. Finch, Herman L. Lofdahl, Kenneth J. Madden, Elmer G. Magnuson, Wilbur L. Martin, William B. Randall, Joe O. Smith and Albert P. Terwilliger. Others from Klamath county are George P. Brown, Beatty, and Norbert Zarbrook, East Malin.

Selected for the trial jury to report Friday are William J. Erdmann, John C. Hill, Leo N. Hils, Frederick Charles Johnson, Robert L. Lakey, John W. Sarginson, Thomas R. Smith and Martin Swanson, all of Klamath Falls, and Orman Weaver, Bly.

A number of Klamath county cases will be considered by the jury including that of Ralph Tice, Chilouin Indian charged with the murder of Eugene Mceme at Chilouin on August 13, 1945. J. C. O'Neill, attorney for Tice, was advised this morning that the trial would probably be held in Medford in the event an indictment is returned against Tice.

Among those going to Medford for the grand jury was Special Indian Officer John Arkell who left Tuesday for the valley.

ever, near Kupehkwow, a main pass from China proper into Jehol province to the north. From Tientsin came reports of imminent government action against "bands" in that area.

Negotiations
Nationalist officials returned to Changchun, Manchurian capital, to renew nearly-completed Sino-Russian negotiations for airborne transfer of additional thousands of government troops into Manchuria.

Cabinet Spokesman P. H. Chang announced the move of government workers to Nanking would include Premier T. V. Soong, and that the executive Yuan would meet there after Dec. 15.

In Tokyo, two long-squelched questions popped into the open in the diet or parliament: Did Hirohito help push Japan into the war; and should he abdicate? Government officials answering the questions, which had been asked from the floor, said (1) no, and (2) no! The mere fact either question was raised, however, started everyone concerned.

In Manila, the U. S. military commission trying Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita on war-crimes charges heard final arguments and promised a verdict by Friday.

The prosecution asked death by hanging. The defense insisted that to avoid hypocrisy, "we must find Yamashita not guilty!"

Yamashita was visibly impressed by that. He gripped his defense counsel warmly by the shoulders and exclaimed "Thank you! Thank you!"

The British denied an Indonesian nationalist radio announcement that a truce had been arranged in Bandung, Java, and said they had sent Indian troops supported by tanks and artillery against an Indonesian-held building there.

The British also reported fighting in Ambarawa and Semarang on the strife-ridden island.

Local Resident Passes Away

John A. Varner, 74, who made his home in Klamath Falls for 58 years, died at a local hospital Tuesday night following a brief illness. Mr. Varner was born in Modoc county, Calif., in 1871, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert D. Varner, pioneer ranchers of that area. The family moved to Linkville, now Klamath Falls, in 1887, and settled on a ranch in what is known as the Altamont district.

Mr. Varner and his two brothers, Samuel of Grants Pass and Alfred of this city, farmed for many years in this section. Mr. Varner was also in mill work here for a time and eight years ago went to work at the Bohemian restaurant where he was employed at the time of his death. In addition to his two brothers, Mr. Varner is survived by a sister, Mrs. Sarah Smith of this city. The parents died here, the father in 1913, the mother in 1893. Final rites will be held at Ward's chapel Thursday at 2:30 p. m. with interment in Linkville cemetery.

TAMALE PIE

3 cups boiling water
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup yellow corn meal
2 tbsps. bacon fat or other shortening
1 large onion, minced
1/2 cup green pepper, minced
1 lb. hamburger
1 1/2 tbsps. chili powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 cans Del Monte Tomato Sauce
1/2 cup cold water
1 heaped-up cup of ripe olives, drained

In the top of a double boiler but over direct heat, bring the water to a rolling boil and add the salt. Very slowly add the corn meal, stirring constantly. Boil hard for 2 minutes, then place over boiling water and cook for at least 30 minutes. Meanwhile, heat the fat in a skillet and fry the onion, peppers, and the hamburger fine brown. Add the chili powder, salt and pepper. Tomato Sauce, water and the drained olives. Simmer slowly for 15 minutes, then turn into a casserole that is about 8 x 10 x 2 1/2 inches. Top carefully with the hot cornmeal mush to make a crust. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about one hour. Serves 5-6.
