

JSDA War Board Ends As New Councils Take Over

The state USDA war board as gone out of existence to be replaced by the state USDA council, the change having been officially made in Portland recently at a meeting attended by representatives of state and federal agencies in the agricultural field.

Robert B. Taylor, Adams farmer and chairman of the state A.A. committee, was chosen chairman of the new council as he was head of the war board. Jack Horton, assistant regional director of the U. S. forest service, is secretary.

Councils Formed
County councils will now be formed throughout the state, the purpose of both state and county groups being to coordinate the activities of all federal and state agencies serving agriculture.

While the councils are formed under authority of the U. S. department of agriculture, other related agency representatives will be invited to join the Oregon councils, such as the grazing and reclamation service and Smith-Hughes instructors, it was decided at the Portland meeting.

The chief difference in function between the war boards and the new councils is that the former dealt primarily with war emergency activities, while the latter will be concerned with the whole peacetime programs of the agencies concerned reports W. L. Teutsch, assistant director of extension, who represented that service at the organization meeting.

The house appropriations committee cut the requested sum to \$500,000 and the house sustained the committee despite Stockman's efforts to increase the amount from the floor.

Stockman cited a situation at The Dalles, Ore., in support of his demand for adequate investigation funds.

Centering about The Dalles, Stockman said, is "one of the finest fruit growing sections of the United States." He asserted that it now faces ruin through no fault of the growers.

Serious Droughts
"Because of the serious droughts of the past few years," he explained, "many of the trees are dying and, unless immediate action is taken to provide a supplemental water supply through irrigation, irreparable damage will be done."

He told the house that some growers have drilled wells and installed their own sprinkling systems. This, he said, has been too costly and the underground water supply is not adequate to serve the whole district.

The people of The Dalles, he said, are hoping to draw a sufficient supply from the Columbia river by pumping. Before this can be undertaken, he said, the reclamation bureau is required by law to make an investigation to determine whether the proposal is economically sound and feasible from an engineering standpoint, how much it would cost and whether the growers would be able to repay the costs.

The investment, he asserted, would be returned many times over.

ing was light due to the difficulty in obtaining cars for shipment. Another factor in the market situation is the tendency of growers to hold their wheat until after the first of the year.

Midwest prices of all feed grains not already at the ceiling made further gains. This reflects the increased demand from feeders. Shipments of stocker and feeder cattle into the corn belt in October this year were the largest on record for the month. In-shipments for the entire season show an increase of 27 per cent over the same period last year.

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Oregon Youth Wins Contest

CINCINNATI, Dec. 6 (AP)—James L. Ammon, 18-year-old Albany, Ore., farm boy, who produced \$5300 in truck crops last summer, was selected today as 1945 champion in the National Junior Vegetable Growers association production-marketing contest.


Ammon topped contestants from 46 states who were competing for \$6000 in scholarships. Results of the contest were announced by Prof. Grant B. Snyder, Massachusetts State college, adult advisor of the junior group, as nearly 500 delegates opened the organization's 11th annual convention.

The champion used 14 acres for vegetables on the 88-acre farm owned by his widowed mother, Mrs. Mary Ammon, and produced a variety of crops including 110 tons of carrots for an Oregon cannery.

Runners-up as regional champions included Jack Grenz, 16, Albany, Ore.
