Newspapers Reflect Trend Of Community, Prillaman

"Newspapers are the open sesame to the heart of a community, reflecting the trend of its interests in history as it is happening."

That is what Lexro B. Prillaman, professor of geo-politics and history at Lincoln high school, Portland, told approximately 100 guests at the inter-club dinner last night, in what he called his preamble.

The dinner was presided over by Mrs. Donald F. McKay, president of Klamath County League of Women Voters. Carl

Hagel sang a variety of solos, accompanied by Mrs. John Beeson. Prillaman, a native of Oregon, has a weighty educational background. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon and Northwestern university. He has taught in four colleges, a university, an academy and three high schools, and has taught speech and debate at the American Institute of Bankers, Portland.

Geo-Politics With the aid of a world map, Prillaman explained geo-politics or political geography, holding the attention of his audience for a solid hour. He explained the "inner island," the "heart country," and the "outer island" of the world and showed how if Hitler had followed his original plan, adopted from a book written by a Scotchman on geo-politics, he could have ruled the world.

He explained how Alaska is the geographical political center of the world, and concluded his lecture by saying that communities and nations could get along like neighbors on the same street of a country town, in spite of religious and political differences.

Local Man On Stalled Ship

T/Sgt. Russell Fairchild Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Fairchild of Kesterson road, was one of 541 homeward-bound American troops aboard the Liberty ship Henry Ward Beecher, which radioed for help a few days ago after losing its propeller 340 miles northeast of Bermuda.

Within two hours of receiving the distress call, a navy tug was on its way to take the stalled ship back to Bermuda.

Fairchild served overseas with the 84th infantry, and along with other high-point army men was transferred to the 542nd ordnance heavy maintenance company to come back to the United States.

He has been in service for three and a half years, and was in combat from the Battle of the Bulge until the end of the war. For the past three months he has been in France waiting for transportation home.

The Henry Ward Beecher was scheduled to arrive in New York on December 3. Latest word is that the men may come to the United States on another vessel in order to reach home by Christmas.

Fairchild was graduated in 1940 from Klamath Union high school. Also living in Klamath Falls is his wife, the former Patricia Peyton and their three-year-old daughter.
