

Oliver Lauds KUHS Spirit On Gridiron

Bill Sari Honored By Teammates At Football Banquet

"As long as we have boys playing football we don't need to worry about the future of the country," Oregon Coach Gerald "Tex" Oliver told a Lions club-KUHS gridiron banquet crowd at the Willard last night and went on to say that football was incomparable in instilling the qualities of idealism, unselfishness and consideration.

Oliver was unable to bring Bill Abbey or Jake Leicht to the banquet. He drove down over the Willamette pass and was 45 minutes late getting here.

He paid high tribute to Abbey, freshman quarterback for the Webfoots and the only Klamath Falls player on the Oregon team, calling him a "good, level-headed signal caller," who shows great courage in continuing to play football in the face of injuries that have hampered both his high school and college career.

"Boys like Abbey and Leicht make the game worthwhile and make coaching worthwhile," Oliver said.

Tex refrained from discussing Oregon's football this year or in the future because such a talk in the presence of high school gridironers—the entire KUHS squad was there—might be a violation of the straight-laced conference "no recruiting" rules.

He proved to be as able an after-dinner speaker as he is a football coach and drew on his long experience with athletics both in the service and out for a long string of anecdotes which made clear the coach's part in a successful grid team.

Oliver was introduced by John Sandmeyer, Jaycee president who acted as toastmaster.

Bill Sari, KUHS senior who played in both the line and backfield for the Pelicans this season, was honored by his teammates who named him honorary captain for the year and the one man who furnished the greatest inspiration to the team during the year.

Bill's name will be the first to be engraved on a perpetual trophy dedicated to the former KUHS athletes who were killed in the war.

Minor Loops Crack At Chandler's Powers

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 8 (P)—Major league baseball magnates were Chicago-bound today, faced with the job of deciding whether to join the minor loops in clipping the powers of Baseball Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler.

The minors, who ended their biggest convention in history here yesterday, took three separate cracks at Chandler's powers but all must be approved by the majors at their convention in Chicago next week before they can be written into baseball law.

The minors first voted to take the postwar baseball promotional organization out of the commissioner's office and approved a proposal to take away from the commissioner the right to construe any major-minor league rule as being "detrimental" to baseball.

PORTLAND, Dec. 8 (P)—The special season Dec. 1-5 in the Fort Rock area netted Oregon hunters 582 does, with 590 sportsmen checking into the grounds, State Game Supervisor Frank B. Wire said today.

The slaughter seemed to have little effect on the number of lady deer cavorting around the region, he reported. Game commission biologists had reported 12,000 to 15,000 deer jamming the sector, many starving from lack of feed.
