

Plenty Of Turkeys For Christmas Feast

There will be plenty of high quality turkeys for Klamath Falls Christmas feasts this year, C. A. Henderson, county agent said.

More than enough fine, heavy birds have been raised in the Klamath basin to supply local needs, he said, and several hundred have already been shipped to the San Francisco bay area.

Henderson stated further that the birds raised this year are the best quality he has ever seen.

The Klamath turkey crop is not large compared with other years, quality concentrated upon by growers rather than quantity.

Action Deferred On Yamashita

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The supreme court today deferred any action on a request by Japanese General Tomoyuki Yamashita that it intervene in the war criminal case which brought his conviction and the death sentence.

Yamashita appealed to the supreme court requesting that it grant a writ of habeas corpus and also a writ of prohibition, prohibiting continuation of his trial before a military commission in Manila.

After arrival of the petition the general was convicted in Manila and sentenced to hang. Yamashita then cabled to the high tribunal a request that it stay his execution pending final action on his case by the court.

Mercury Hits Seasonal Low In Klamath

The mercury hit a seasonal low this weekend when barometrical readings of 29.8 were registered 20 degrees at the 11th street station.

Motorists slipped and slid on city streets as they came to work this morning and a number of minor traffic accidents were reported.

Sunday, just two weeks before the Christmas holidays, found hundreds of cars in the wooded areas. Lush Christmas trees of red and white firs, Oregon grape, cedar, pine cones and juniper to be fashioned into all sorts of decorations for the home.

Some greens gatherers returned from the mountain areas in a heavy snow storm which started just at dusk last night. The mercury started falling about that time and highways were slick.

Roads Hazardous Throughout the state, the highway commission reported roads hazardous. The mountain passes were listed as extremely dangerous without chains.

A nationwide report on weather advised that temperatures ranging from 15 below zero to below freezing extended today from the Rocky Mountains east.

It was coldest at Minot, N. D., where the reading was 18 below. Other subzero weather included: Alexandria and Willmar, Minn., -14; Ashley, N. D., -12; Aberdeen, S. D., -12; Mason City, Ia., -4; Havre, Mont., -13; Big Piney, Wyo., -13; Pueblo, Colo., -13; Sidney, Neb., -2; and -2 to -5 in Wisconsin near the Minnesota border.

Forecast for the next 24 hours in the Klamath area was "warmer with light rains."

Shopping Spree Expected Here

Klamath merchants said today they were anticipating the biggest holiday shopping spree in the history of the town despite the lack of merchandise and the early start of the shopping season.

The pitch is expected this weekend. Customers were waiting over high prices and comparatively poor merchandise, according to several merchants. Stores may remain open nights the Friday and Saturday before Christmas but it is unlikely business will continue after 6 p. m. Christmas eve.

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Two Jail-Breakers Nabbed By State Police At Ranch

Shades of the Old West! Stolen cars taking the place of plunging broncs, hacksaw blades slipped into jail cells, and the offenders already hunted by the law, cropped out in a story released today by the state police.

In the county jail are Robert Perrington Allen, 22, Modoc Inn, Calif., and his companion Edward Lee Hill, 25-year-old Cheyenne, Wyoming resident. Allen is also said to be a deserter from the United States navy when he forgot to report back in November following leave.

Also sought are two other companions, Herculano Sanchez and Thomas J. Dryden who, Seattle police said, hacksawed their way out of the Kitsap county jail, Port Orchard, Wash., along with Allen and Hill.

To start out, the four were lodged in the Kitsap jail, Allen on a charge of larceny from a person, Hill, Sanchez and Dryden serving time on car theft. The men said a friend of Dryden's slipped them the hacksaw. On the night of November 24, Sanchez and Dryden hacked their way through the bars and skipped. Hill and Allen told police that the bars were off the window but that they didn't take off until the next night.

In Vancouver, Wash., where they said they hitchhiked and spent two days, the two commandeered a 1932 Chevrolet coupe. Seattle police report the car stolen from that city. Anyway, the men said they drove through Portland to Alturas where they stayed with a friend, Charles Peedee. They returned to Oregon driving to the Quincy Baker place at Beatty where the Chevrolet was found with the two rear wheels wrecked. They had been driven on the rim.

Then, according to Hill and Allen, they came to Klamath Falls and bought some liquor and returned to Beatty where they saw a car registered to Edward J. Walker of Beatty. They took this car and while driving along Highway 66, admittedly struck John W. Lee, about 60, also of Beatty. Lee's injuries were not serious although he is confined to his bed with shock, officers said.

After the car had battered Lee around, the men ran the machine off the road and went bounding over a boulder strewn field. The car refused to go on and the machine was abandoned there. Hill and Allen continued to the Baker ranch where state police arrested them December 6.

The two waived preliminary hearing when they were brought before Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney, and are in jail in lieu of \$1000 cash bail each.

December 15 Last Day For Potato Loans

There will be no exceptions to the closing date of December 15 for accepting potato loan applications at the county AAA office. It will be necessary that the county committee refuse to accept any applications for loans after noon of Saturday, December 15, in order that they may be inspected and loan documents completed by December 31.

A rather large number of growers are known to be waiting until nearly the closing of the application period. These and other growers who may be warned that should a large volume of applications be presented that the volume of work required might be too great for all to be handled within the required time.

Up to December 9, 52 applications have been submitted offering approximately 209,878 sacks of potatoes for loan. Fourteen loans have been completed on 53,917 sacks, amounting to \$60,592 in loans.
