

Pacific AC Meet Faces Big Fight

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10 (AP)—Pacific Coast Athletic conference representatives opened their first postwar winter pow-wow here today confronted with such controversial questions as what to do with the strict conference athletic code, the wartime rule permitting freshman eligibility for major varsity sports, the round-robin football schedule, and selection of a new commissioner.

Most of the fireworks is expected over action on the athletic code, and the naming of a successor to the late Edward N. Atherton as conference commissioner or abandonment of the office.

Sentiment has been reported strong against the present stringent regulations which have caused several apparently innocent athletes to be ruled ineligible for violations charged through technical interpretations of subsidization and proselyting.

Rumors were current that Frank Wickhorst, former University of California line coach and director of extensive navy pre-flight athletic training, has the inside track for Atherton's job if it is filled.

Opposition by California members is expected to the full round-robin football schedule adopted in 1941 but never put into operation because of the war. Its use would force southern schools to eliminate non-conference games with such schools as St. Mary's, Santa Clara, Loyola, College of the Pacific and the University of San Francisco.

Buddy Young Beats Marines Giving Bluejackets Title

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10 (AP)—The army can have Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard. The Fleet City Navy and the sportswriters and football followers who saw him unwind three spectacular scoring runs against the El Toro Marines—will take Claude (Buddy) Young.

Young, 160-pound Chicago negro who played one year at Illinois, returned a kickoff 94 yards and a punt 88 yards for touchdowns the first two times he touched the ball yesterday as the Bluejackets captured the unofficial service grid title, 48-25.

The five-foot-five formed Big 10 sprint champion later tallied the winning touchdown on a 20-yard end sweep.

"The greatest runner I have ever seen—bar none," said Lt. Col. Dick Hanley, coach of the Marines. And Hanley has seen most of the greats of the last three decades.

Young, playing less than 20 minutes, netted 75 yards in 10 scrimmage tries. He now has scored 10 touchdowns, all on dashes of at least 20 yards. His ball-carrying average is almost eight yards per try—534 yards in 68 trips.

Yesterday's super-thriller before 59,143 fans gave the undefeated Bluejackets their 10th win against one tie. It was their second victory over the Marines.

Deer Herd To Be Counted

PORTLAND, Dec. 10 (AP)—Censuses of the interstate deer herd that summers in Oregon and winters in California will be taken from now on by the Oregon state game commission in cooperation with the California commission and other agencies.

Oregon and California officials decided at a meeting here Saturday to make joint surveys to obtain detailed information about numbers and the effect of forest scarcity. Gordon True, assistant chief of the bureau of game conservation, San Francisco, was named chairman of a planning committee for the census. The forest service, stock-

men's associations, and any interested federal agency will participate in the game survey.

The migratory herd of 12,000 to 15,000 deer summers in Oregon and then moves down into the Lava Bed country in California for the winter. During Oregon's shooting season, September 28 to October 28, the herd is still in this state.

The problem of scarce forage—caused partly by caterpillar blight—occupied most of the round table discussions. "Forage is the basic resource," said John McKeen, Oregon big game manager.
