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## Jap 'Repats' Will Sail On December 16

TULELAKE—The second sailing of voluntary repatriates for Japan, originally scheduled by the department of justice for December 7 has been postponed until December 16 when a ship with accommodations for 5000 will leave from Seattle.

Male residents of internment camps, who are also to be returned to Japan and who are members of families leaving from the Tulelake center, will meet those leaving here at the point of embarkation provided these relatives have applied for voluntary repatriation and have volunteered to leave on this ship.

No person is to be placed aboard this vessel if he does not ask to go even though a request to that effect has been previously made.

Residents of the center have been assured by the department of justice that no punishment will be inflicted nor will living status of the individual be jeopardized in case plans are changed for sailing.

Family groups, single males and single females will be included in the group. The first sailing was for unattached men only.
