

# 36 Officials At Notorious Dachau Camp Sentenced To Die On Gallows

DACHAU, Dec. 13 (AP)—A U. S. military court today sentenced 36 officials and guards at the notorious Dachau concentration camp to death by hanging for the murder, torture and starvation of thousands of the camp's inmates.

Another defendant was sentenced to life imprisonment and three others were sentenced to terms of 10 years each.

The 40 defendants were convicted yesterday by the military tribunal, which debated only 90 minutes before bringing in its verdict. Among those convicted were five camp doctors and three prisoners who had collaborated with the SS.

Witnesses at the trial said that 5000 Jews were killed at Dachau, that inmates were brutally beaten, that naked men were immersed in ice water for experiments and that some men were sent to the crematory while still alive.

**Most Feared**  
The camp was the most notorious and most feared of the concentration camps set up by the nazis for political prisoners. The men who operated the horror camp received their sentences calmly for the most part, only a few showing any change of expression.

The life sentence went to Peter Betz, a guard, against

whom there was little evidence of personal cruelty. Ten-year terms were given Hugo Lausterer, who was said by witnesses to have been kind to prisoners; Albin Gretsich, who was drafted into the SS and against whom no personal accusations of cruelty were made, and Johann Schoepp, who was drafted from the Romanian army by the SS and assigned to guard the Dachau tower.

**Doctor to Die**  
Dr. Klaus Karl Schilling, 74, who killed many prisoners in experiments through which he sought a malaria vaccine, and SS Officer Martin Weiss, commandant of the camp, were among the 36 sentenced to die.

Schilling, who last week begged the court for time to complete his experimental records, blinked his eyes rapidly and bowed his bearded head when he heard the words: "Death by Hanging."

Among those sentenced to die were Leonhard Eichberger and Sylvester Filleboeck, SS guards accused specifically by participating in the execution of 95 captive Russian officers, Johann Kick, in whose office nails were reported torn from the toes and fingers of captives during interrogation, and Franz Boettger.

## Shoe Prices Not To Be Increased

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—OPA said today there will be no increase in prices the public pays for shoes despite a price hike granted to manufacturers. The agency ruled that a 44 per cent producer's increase to go into effect soon must be absorbed by retailers and wholesalers.

OPA asserted that under this plan, dealers would still make "considerably more" than their peacetime profit. As for retailers, the agency said their current profits are 7.8 per cent, or 6.1 percentage points higher than in 1936-39.

## Man Dies After Logging Accident

COLVILLE, Dec. 13 (AP)—Mike Wagner, 44, died today of injuries received Sunday when struck by a pole at logging operations in the Little Pend Oreille lakes district. A steel cable being dragged behind Wagner's tractor picked up a pole and threw it into the air and across the tractor.

## Joblessness Lighter Than Anticipated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—The impact of peace on joblessness is 30 to 40 per cent lighter than reconversion officials anticipated. Fewer lay-offs in industry and an unexpectedly high and sustained rate of buying are among factors that have prompted key federal economists to offer this improved employment outlook.

By year's end, the total of actual and potential job-seekers will be 4,000,000 at the most, one-third less than had been predicted for that date when hostilities ceased. By next March the jobless will number not more than 5,000,000. This may be the peak for 1946.

**Officials Wary**  
After hovering around that mark until about June the total may begin to decline as civilian manufacturing hits full stride. But officials are wary of guessing beyond mid-1946.

The totals fall far short of Reconversion Director John W. Snyder's estimate, on October 1, that unemployment would hit 8,000,000 by spring. However, it is known that the forecasts are concurred in by experts in Snyder's office, the bureau of census and some other agencies concerned with the employment problem.

The happier outlook may bring a different sort of problem. Price Administrator Chester Bowles has indicated. He said Monday that the continued high rate of employment was adding to inflationary pressure, making it harder to end price controls.

## Safe Containing \$50,000 Stolen

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13 (AP)—A \$50,000 theft from a Portland residence—largest cash loot on record here—was reported today after the owner and an acquaintance had determined extent of their losses.

Police said a safe weighing 175 pounds had been removed from behind a hidden panel in a closet at the home of Ruth Barnett, Portland naturologist, December 6 while the woman was away.

Dr. Barnett said she lost \$10,000 in cash, and a friend, Earl Bush, Coos Bay pinball game operator, \$40,000. Police said floor markings indicated the safe was taken out the front door of the home.

## Alfred Vanderbilt Elopes To Philly

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 13 (AP)—Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt, 33, multi-millionaire New Yorker, prominent horse racing devotee and a recently discharged navy lieutenant, eloped to Philadelphia yesterday with 22-year-old Jeanne Lourdes Murray, Judge Charles Klein—the best man—disclosed.

The bride, cousin of Mrs. Henry Ford II, is the daughter of Mrs. John F. Murray, New York City.

## New Method To Eliminate Trees Favored

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—New methods of eliminating snags and old trees, one of the big problems of forest fire fighting and prevention in Douglas fir regions of Oregon and Washington, was proposed today by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.)

Ellsworth suggested the forest service use some of the surplus war high explosives to do the job.

He asked Lyle F. Watts, chief of the service, to obtain high explosives from the surplus property division and to have agents

plant a ring of nitroglycerin or modern higher explosives around each of the snags or trees.

**Worth Trying**  
"Dynamite which has been tried merely splinters the stumps and leaves the danger," Ellsworth said. "If we used a ring of higher explosives the menacing dead timber would simply dissolve and the danger would be removed permanently. At least the plan is worth trying."

Ellsworth told Watts the snags and old trees heretofore have been removed at great expense

and loss of time by hand labor. "It occurs to me that snag removal could be much more efficiently and economically accomplished by using some of the surplus high explosive material left over from the war," his letter continued. "I refer to something like nitroglycerin or its modern equivalent. It seems to me that a ring of such material could be placed around the snag and detonated, so as to remove all trace of it with one shot."
