

Oklahoma Badman Dies In Arkansas Hospital

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 14 (AP)—Mitt Kimes, 30, Oklahoma badman held by federal authorities for a Texas robbery, died at 7:54 a. m., today at the Baptist State hospital here.

Kimes had been in the hospital since December 1 when he was struck down on a North Little Rock street by a poultry truck, ending a three-months manhunt over a four state area.

One of the most notorious and colorful southwestern desperadoes of the past quarter century, Kimes' death followed an operation performed last night to correct internal injuries sustained

in the traffic accident that led to his capture.

The former convict, furloughed last July from the Oklahoma penitentiary after serving 18 years for murder, suffered a fractured left leg, scalp and hand lacerations in addition to internal injuries.

Unconscious when picked up after the accident, Kimes' identity was established when officials became curious about a pistol found at the scene of the accident and \$1835 found in his clothing at the hospital.

The FBI filed a fugitive warrant against Kimes a few days after his apprehension charging complicity in the \$17,000 holdup of the First State bank of Morton, Tex., September 5. He was held for \$75,000 bond.

Special Agent Dean Morley in charge of the FBI office here said Kimes' body would be turned over to relatives. A sister was at his bedside when he died, Morley said.

The FBI never was able to get Kimes' story of where he had been hiding between the time of the Morton holdup and his accident in North Little Rock. Morley said that on the advice of physicians the FBI had not attempted to question the injured prisoner although he was conscious much of the time.

Commons Approves U. S. Loan

LONDON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The house of commons today gave final ratification to the Bretton Woods monetary stabilization pact, approval of which was one of the conditions laid down by the United States for a loan of \$4,400,000,000 to Britain.

The measure was passed without dissent on its third and last reading and went at once to the house of lords. The action came barely 14 hours after commons had approved the terms of the loan by a vote of 345 to 98.

A sharp debate, punctuated by personal clashes between labor and conservative leaders, preceded the vote on the loan terms.
