Soroptimists Meet Thursday

A cheerful group of 34 Soroptimist members and guests were greeted by a beautifully decorated table, colorful with Christmas candles, silver snow and bright paper nut cups, when they entered the Pelican party room for their noon luncheon Thursday. Following the salute to the flag, President Kathleen Thompson led the club in singing the beautiful old Christmas carol, "Silent Night." Although scheduled to be a business meeting, in order to give more time to one of the finest programs offered for the year, all business but the most important was held over until the next meeting.

In spite of the fact that it might appear there could be nothing new to say on the subject of Christmas Seals, after the many years these decorative little stamps have been with us, Kelley Farris of the Klamath Union high school speech department spoke on the topic, "The Christmas Seal." Following along the same general line, Mrs. R. P. Ellingson, president of the Klamath County Public Health association, gave a report on the work being accomplished by that organization. She told of successful efforts made to return sick persons to their homes in neighboring states when these persons lacked sufficient means to reach their people. Mrs. Ellingson also spoke of the work done by the organization in bringing the mobile X-ray unit to the county this summer, of the tremendous number of X-ray pictures taken. Mrs. Ellingson was introduced by Lydia Fricke Howard, whose work in the community over many years has been recognized as outstanding in the health program.

A joyful surprise was given the club by the attendance of Mrs. Henry Ray, whose ill health had kept her in a lower altitude for many months. With health restored Mrs. Ray expects to remain at her ranch in the Keno district indefinitely. Visitors at the meeting were Mary Trulove, president of the Venture club, and another Venturist, Shirley Bock. Rita Whisenant, Venture club adviser, reported that a generous donation given by an unknown benefactor was enabling the Venturists to purchase, wrap and deliver Christmas packages to wounded service men hospitalized for an indefinite period. This live young women's club under the leadership of Mrs. Whisenant is donating one evening a week to the USO as well as doing other civic work.

A report was given by five members appointed by President Kathleen Thompson at the last luncheon to send warm clothing and packages to Holland Soroptimists who were in dire need following the treatment accorded them by the Germans. Among the gifts of cloth-

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ing mailed by the committee were four warm coats, stockings, five sweaters, shoes, dresses and underwear. Things needed are soap, dried fruits, powdered eggs, anything in the way of food stuffs which can be shipped overseas. This is a project of the American Federation of Soroptimist clubs and each club in the federation has obligated itself to send at least five bundles a month. The Klamath Falls club has undertaken to send not less than eight bundles.

A report on the fund raised for the purpose of training young Chinese girls in public health and nursing showed that Soroptimists and friends had contributed \$105 to be forwarded to the American Federation headquarters for Chinese relief.

A letter from the American Federation president, Lois Bell Sandall, reported that the international committee had planned one of the expenditures of the Madame Noel Fund for rehabilitation of European Soroptimist clubs, would be the purchase of surgical supplies to be shipped to Holland where Soroptimist doctors will use them to save lives. Another expenditure will be the purchase of baby food and diapers for the children of France, to be personally distributed by Dr. Suzanne Noel. Each Soroptimist club has been asked to nominate an outstanding woman of its community for the Helen Gamble Award, \$1000 having been appropriated for this award, plus necessary traveling expenses to Oakland in the convention year of 1946. This award is not restricted to Soroptimists, nor are Soroptimists excluded.
