

Demos Minus Candidate For Mott Vacancy

SALEM, Dec. 17 (AP)—Democrats were still without a candidate today to oppose Walter Brown, Astoria, in the January 11 special election for U. S. representative from the first district.

The democratic congressional committee met here Saturday afternoon and endorsed Bruce Spaulding, Salem attorney, but their plans to hold a nominating convention the same afternoon went awry because they couldn't assemble the 250 voters needed to constitute a nominating convention.

In fact, only 109 persons showed up, although sound trucks toured crowded downtown streets appealing for persons to go to the assembly, so Spaulding could not be nominated.

Balloting

Of the 109 persons, 66 favored Spaulding, 27 favored State Rep. Manley J. Wilson of Clatsop-Columbia counties, and 16 were for State Rep. Jack Bain of Milwaukie.

Although the balloting was merely advisory, Wilson and Bain withdrew from the race.

Spaulding said today he has not decided whether to try to hold another nominating convention, or whether to distribute petitions. Names of 3600 voters would be needed on petitions.

The committee refused to nominate Spaulding on grounds it had no power to do so.

If Spaulding succeeds in getting his name on the ballot, he would run as an independent, while Norblad would have his republican label printed after his name.
