

Shanghai Will Hail Marshall

SHANGHAI, Dec. 19 (AP)—This city prepared to welcome General George C. Marshall tomorrow amid speculation the special American envoy would meet Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek at Nanking.

The American general, on whom China pins hopes for an early end to fratricidal strife, will fly to Nanking Friday, it was learned reliably.

The World Daily News in Chungking said Marshall would meet Chiang at Nanking, for the first time, and accompany him to Chungking.

Chiang returned in triumph

late yesterday to Nanking, the prewar capital from which he and his government were driven by the Japanese in 1937.

Accompanied by Madame Chiang, he flew there in a Chinese-manned C-47 from Peiping, where he told correspondents he was glad President Truman "reaffirmed the original United States policy toward China."

"I admire him because he has shown he understands the situation in this country," the generalissimo said.

Marshall arrived in Manila today and plans to leave for Shanghai tomorrow morning.

Compromise GI Bill Approved

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—The senate and house today approved a compromise GI bill of rights and sent it to the White House.

The house, acting first, adopted it on a standing vote of 134 to 23. The senate shouted its approval, without objection, on a voice vote.

The bill revises and simplifies many of the provisions of the original GI bill of rights enacted in 1944.

The changes deal primarily with education and loan provisions and removes a requirement of the original law that tuition fees and unemployment allowances of the GI bill be deducted from any future bonus congress may vote for veterans.

County School Bus Drivers Do Fine Job

If you think a short trip over an ice-covered highway or down a frozen country road is bad, imagine the troubles the county school bus drivers are having making the same trips day in and day out in all sorts of weather and under every driving condition.

The county is operating 30 buses daily, ferrying youngsters to the various grade and high schools and the school buses must get through, no matter what the road conditions.

Most of the routes are fairly short, 30-35 miles for a two-way trip, the driver generally starting from a point near his home, picks up children on the way to school in the morning and drops them off in the afternoon.

The longest route in the county is covered by Florence Conklin, who makes about 70 miles a day from Shevlin to Gilchrist and back, hauling upper grade and high school students. That route is the only one going out of the county, a short swing up to the Fremont highway in Deschutes county and then back into Klamath.

Walter Kachuy's Chemult-Gilchrist trip amounts to 65 miles a day. Also up in that district, Betty Hromada drives through the worst snow in the county, from the Crescent Lake, Creswell and Mowich areas to Gilchrist.

The heaviest passenger busload is carried by Florence Conklin.

makes two trips daily from the city suburban district in to Shasta, Altamont secondary and Altamont junior high, carrying 220 pupils. C. A. Clark, driving from Summers, Miller Hill and the old Shaw-Bertram mill to Altamont and Summers schools, carries 180 children a day, and Elmer Provost brings 165 from the city suburbs to Altamont schools and back.

Most of the buses are of various types, capacity of 30 to 60 passengers, but the county has two new carryalls built for 65 passengers. Jack Lowderbaugh drives one to Henley school and Clair Hollinbeck takes the other from Kern's lane to Keno with grade school pupils, comes from Keno and Fairhaven with KUHS students from east of Kern's lane to Fairhaven.

Six buses run to Bonanza, two to Bly, three to Malin, two to Merrill, five to Henley and three to Chiloquin.

Altogether more than 1000 youngsters are carried to school and back on buses every day, and the 30 buses travel a total of 1193 miles daily.

Commons Votes To Nationalize Bank Of England

LONDON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Nationalization of the 250-year-old Bank of England won final approval in commons tonight, 306 to 126, and the measure was sent to the house of lords.

Described by labor party members as "a great charter of freedom for the English people," the bill transfers the historic financial institution to public ownership, with administration by a governor, deputy governor and court of 10 directors appointed by the king.

The capital of the private bank was \$58,212,000. It has paid 12 per cent dividends annually since 1923. Shareholders will be compensated with government stocks bearing 3 per cent interest.

Klamath Indians Elect Committee

Eight members of the Klamath tribe, who will serve as the tribal business committee, were named at an election held Tuesday. It was announced by Superintendent B. G. Courtright.

Polls were in operation at Chiloquin, Beatty and Sprague River and elected were Jesse Lee Kirk, Boyd J. Jackson, Clayton Kirk, Dice Crain, James Johnson, Tom Watah, Seldon E. Kirk and Dibbon Cook.

Some of those named Tuesday were also members of the business committee elected exactly 10 years ago Tuesday, Courtright observed.

Seattle Machinists Vote To Strike

SEATTLE, Dec. 19 (AP)—Machinists representing most of the machine shops here voted 1286 to 299 to strike in their demand for a 30 per cent wage increase, retroactive to September 15, Thomas P. Graham Jr., regional director of the National Labor Relations Board, announced today.

Tabulation of the vote of the AFL-International Association of Machinists taken Saturday was completed today. Of 2206 eligible to vote, 1804 cast ballots and nine were void.

Small Town Urged For Site Of UNO

LONDON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Great Britain urged the United Nations preparatory commissions today to consider a small town "in the east of the United States" as the permanent home of the United Nations organization.

The British delegation presented the commission an official document listing considerations which it said should be taken into account in picking the site.

A member of the British delegation said the recommendation could be interpreted as favoring a town "not too close to Washington."

62 Reefer Cars Arrive At Tulelake

The Tulelake area received 62 refrigerator cars, and 15 were spotted nearer Klamath Falls yesterday as the long-awaited increase of reefers arrived to break a threatened bottleneck in Klamath basin potato shipments.

Southern Pacific officials said today that potato growers could expect a steady flow from now on.

House Approves Palestine Policy

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—The house joined the senate today in favoring free entry of Jews into Palestine.

The house agreed to a senate-passed resolution calling on the government to "use its good offices" with Great Britain for opening Palestine fully to Jewish people.

The bill does not require the president's signature. It is merely an expression of congressional views.

The house approved the resolution by voice vote, after the chamber had defeated by a 133 to 38 standing vote a motion to send it back to the foreign affairs committee.

Elderly Man Burned To Death In Blaze

MOUNT VERNON, Dec. 19 (AP)—An elderly man was burned to death and a volunteer fireman was injured seriously when fire destroyed a half block of business buildings early today.

James Barton, 72, a bachelor, died in the flames when he broke away from firemen and ran back into his second floor room in one of the burning buildings in an attempt to recover his clothing.

Gerald Nelson, a fireman, was badly burned in an explosion in one of the structures.

The fire, starting in the basement of the Rood Implement company building, spread rapidly through adjoining structures.

Congressional Socks Hang In Washington

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Santa Claus will find all but one pair of Oregon's congressional socks hanging from fireplaces in the national capitol this year.
