Tire Stocks Larger Here

Tire stocks at most local retailers are generally larger at present than a few months ago but inventories still are not up to pre-war levels. A shortage still exists in heavy logging tires, a survey showed today.

While most dealers reported a fair number of passenger automobile tires in their racks, one store manager advised that his stock was at its all-time low, and he didn't look for much improvement for at least another month.

Radiator anti-freeze, another short item, was still hard to get, and local outlets reported only small incoming shipments which are generally sold out as soon as they arrive. Alcohol for radiators, while a little more plentiful than the non-evaporating type anti-freeze, is available at most service stations and automobile accessory stores.
