WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—President Truman, his face crinkled in smiles, received today his first Christmas present—an oil portrait of his mother, Mrs. Martha Truman.

Told by Frank S. Land, who made the presentation, that his 93-year-old mother had sat from five to six hours a day for six days, during the painting, the president commented:

"They don't make them like her anymore."

Land, secretary-general of the Order of Demolay, presented the portrait on behalf of that organization in a brief ceremony at the president's office.

Land said that when he talked last with the president's mother at Grandview, Mo., she told him: "You tell him to come when he can, but you tell him, Harry, you behave yourself!"

"She's been telling me that for 80 years," the president remarked with a laugh, adding that he intended to hang the portrait in the White House study "where I can see it all the time."

Jerry Farnsworth, Cape Cod, Mass., artist, painted the portrait.

# Four Persons Die In Blaze

WOODBURN, Dec. 19 (AP)—A mother and her three little daughters were burned to death this morning when their farm home burned in the Union district, three miles east of here.

The dead are:

Mrs. Bessie Seely, 25.

Caroline Jean Seely, 3 years.

Sharon Rae Seely, 20 months.

Her husband, Norman Seely, said he got up this morning, built a fire, and went across the road to help his father, Ralph Seely, do the morning chores.

At 8:15 a. m., they noticed the home in flames, but could do nothing about it, as they were an eighth of a mile away.

It was not known whether the victims were trapped in bed by the flames, or were suffocated.

Mrs. Seely was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Simmons of Portland. The Seely family is one of the most prominent in the district.



# Army Reduces Point Score For Discharge

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—The army announced today another cutback in requirements for release from service, effective December 31. It will make an additional 600,000 men and women eligible for separation.

The changes include a reduction in the point score for enlisted men to 50 and for officers to 70.

For the first time, length of service will be computed in the case of Wac personnel. Enlisted Wacs will be eligible if they have had two years and six months of honorable service. Wac officers will be eligible if they have had three years and three months.

The length of service required for separation will be reduced by six months to 42 months for enlisted men and by three months to 48 months for male officers except medical department officers.

The age criteria was reduced by three years to 45 years for



all medical and dental officers except plastic surgeons.

The critical score will be reduced by five points to 65 for dental and veterinary corps officers and all medical officers except certain specialists. The factors for release of sanitary corps officers, medical administrative corps officers, nurses, physiotherapists, and dietitians remain unchanged.

The army wore out only 30 per cent of its equipment in combat in Europe.

# Vets Needing Aid Urged To See Red Cross

Pointing to Red Cross services to veterans as "a continuation of Red Cross aid which begins when a man enters the armed forces and is extended as long as help is needed," L. Orth Sisemore, chairman of the Klamath county chapter, today urged any veteran in the community who needs help in applying for and securing government benefits, in the preparation of forms, and in obtaining documents, to visit the chapter home service for assistance. The address is upstairs at 518 Main street in Klamath Falls.

Sisemore said the need for services to veterans already has increased as a result of the war's end and predicted an even greater demand for these services in 1946.

"On the basis of experience after World War I, it is expected that Red Cross work with veterans will increase for at least ten years," he asserted.

"Home service in our chapter handled 341 ex-servicemen's cases in 1945 as opposed to 243 in 1944, an increase of 40 per cent. As demobilization is accelerated, our chapter must be prepared to assist increasing numbers of returning veterans.
