

79th Congress, Which Spanned War And Peace, Made Vital Decisions, Heads Toward Session Adjournment

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The 79th congress, which spanned the transition from war to peace and from President Roosevelt to President Truman, today ends the session it started last January 4.

Barring a last-minute upset in plans, it leaves the capital tonight to return for its second and "election year" session on January 14.

It leaves behind a record of stubbornness toward the man who last April moved from the vice president's rostrum in the senate to the White House office vacated by the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

It hasn't taken kindly, and certainly not eagerly, to many of the suggestions Harry S. Truman has made in almost a dozen special messages.

Voice Heard
Although its tally of "things undone" is a long one, the 79th congress, perhaps more than any of its recent predecessors, made its voice heard 'round the world by the things it did.

It ratified the United Nations charter; it overwhelmingly enacted a law to give living effect to this country's participation in UNO; it appropriated new

money to the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration; it extended the lend-lease program and the reciprocal trade agreements act, and it wrote into law the Bretton Woods international monetary agreements.

In doing those things it followed the recommendations of both Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Truman.

On the domestic front it: Appropriated approximately \$68,000,000,000 while a two-front war was in progress and then, after the last shots had been fired, took back some \$52,000,000,000 of current and past year allotments that hadn't been used.

Extended the draft law until next May 15.
Raised the national debt limit to \$300,000,000,000.

Extended price controls until the middle of 1946.
Rewrote the servicemen's GI bill of rights.

Cut income taxes and ordered repeal of the excess profits tax January 1, 1946.
Approved a governmental reorganization plan in response to a request from President Truman.

Property Disposal
Simplified administration of surplus property disposal in accordance with another presidential executive order.

Comprised with the president on return of employment service offices to the states by ordering their return around next April 1 instead of retaining them under federal control until mid-1947 as Mr. Truman wanted.

Voted its 435 house members annual expense allowances of \$2500 each, which the senate declined to approve for itself.

But congress put off until next year action on:
The multi-billion British loan proposal.
Pensions and pay raises for congressmen.

Universal military training.
Merger of the armed services.

186 Vets Face Quarantine

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 20 (AP)—A load of 186 veterans home bound for discharge face holidays aboard ship or in quarantine barracks here because one man is reported to have smallpox, the army said today.

Portland port of embarkation officials said an army surgeon and U. S. public health service physicians would board the troopship Grundy at Astoria early today to decide quarantine measures.

The vessel embarked from Jinsen, Korea.
The army officials said the men would be vaccinated if they have not already been aboard ship. Length of time the men may be held in quarantine depends on when the man reported ill was diagnosed as having smallpox.

Effort Will Be Made To Salvage Vessel

COOS BAY, Ore., Dec. 20 (AP)—An effort will be made to salvage part of the Seattle shark fishing vessel, Rainier, which grounded Friday while inbound to Coos Bay harbor.

The coast guard abandoned hope of refloating the 65-foot craft after a tow line broke. Cargo has been brought in from the vessel, lying on sands north of the jetty here.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (AP)—Retirement of William M. Jeffers as president of the Union Pacific Railroad Co., effective Feb. 1 and the election of George F. Ashby to succeed him was announced following a meeting of directors here today.

White House insistence; and they didn't get out of committee a Truman request for repeal of the Johnson act restricting loans to foreign nations in default on their debts.

The house passed but the senate shelved a proposal that both branches of congress, rather than two-thirds of the senate only, ratify treaties.

The house refused to go along with the senate and with the president on unemployment compensation law revisions; and it toned down sharply the so-called full-employment bill the senate passed. A final verdict was left until next year, when conferees will write a compromise version.
