

Pelican Cafe Remodeling Now Underway

Extensive remodeling is now underway at the Pelican cafe at 722 Main which will greatly enlarge storage and kitchen space and provide an enlarged deep-freeze room for meats, Mrs. Avis McConnell, manager, said today. All of the basement under space formerly occupied by Matt Finnigan's and half of the Western Union office's basement will be utilized, she said.

An enlarged bakery shop will occupy the back third of the basement, and larger quarters for dish-washing will be available, she reported.

Present seating capacity of the cafe and party room will not be enlarged during the remodeling, Mrs. McConnell said.

Construction of a new store, featuring high-quality candies, nuts, fruits and tobaccos will begin soon, Mrs. McConnell said, and will occupy the store space previously occupied by Matt Finnigan's. Operated in conjunction with the Pelican, opening date for the shop will be around April 1.

A door to the new shop will be opened at the spot now occupied by the cashier's desk in the cafe, and patrons will have access to both restaurant and candy shop through this door.

Gift packages of candies, candied fruits, coated nuts and similar products will be featured in the new shop, along with a complete line of tobacco products.

Jap government for a 500 per cent INCREASE in their salaries. Even that, probably, wouldn't make their wages very high, according to our standards, but if we want to think along economic lines we must remember that Japan is a POOR country, with LIMITED resources. How it can rise to even an approximation of American standards of living is a problem.

Our standards are founded upon great NATURAL wealth, plus HUGE PRODUCTION based on intelligent utilization of machinery and power. High living standards don't just grow on trees. There must be a REASON for them.

MEANWHILE— With practically all the rest of the world starving, or in deep trouble, we're piling up new records in the way of Christmas buying. Macy's (huge New York store) has had THREE million-dollar days so far this season, whereas in all its previous history it had had only ONE.

IT'S fine, of course. We love it, and we hope it can go on. But sooner or later we'll have to realize that the United States can't remain an ISLAND of prosperity in a bankrupt world any more than Klamath Falls could remain a prosperous island in a busted Klamath Basin.

Sunshine Mine Fire Spreads

WALLACE, Ida., Dec. 20 (AP)—Fire which has been eating away at timbers and overhead lagging in the famous Sunshine mine of the Coeur d'Alenes for two days had spread some today and mine officials said it was still out of control.

Burning yesterday only on the 3100-foot level, the blaze now has spread through stopes to the 2700 level. Mine Superintendent R. F. Mahoney said at least portions of stopes between the 3100 and 2700 levels and immediately above the latter were afire but that the flames had not broken out on the 2700 level proper.

The crew of 50 trained fire-fighters was pouring water on the flames from both 2700 and 2500-foot levels and was fighting it also from one end.

The men are building bulkheads at various points to cut off ventilation and confine the fire.

Chief In Favor On Baring Books

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—President Truman today declared it essential that fact-finding boards in labor disputes have authority to examine the books of the employers, and unions as well, where the boards deemed it advisable.

The president told a news conference that while neither the government nor its board will endeavor to fix a rate of return for the employer, "since wages are paid out of earnings, the question of earnings is relevant."

Under questioning, after he had read a prepared statement, Mr. Truman declared that the boards also should have power to examine the books of labor unions, too, if they consider such a step will help them in determining disputes issues.
