

Mailing At Post Office Here Heavy

Christmas mailing at Klamath Falls post office has been extremely heavy this year, Burt E. Hawkins, postmaster, said today. The 1945 volume of mail passing through this office lacks only a small margin of equaling that of 1944, he said, in spite of military installations moving out of the vicinity. This year's mail is much heavier than pre-war years.

Last Tuesday was the heaviest day in out-going mail at the main office and also at the sub-station on S. 6th. Long queues of people extended the length of the lobby on that day, waiting to mail packages. Very few of the persons mailed only one package, and most of them had five or six.

Mailing started falling off Wednesday and Friday business was almost back to normal. Incoming mail is increasing daily however, Hawkins said, as Christmas approaches. Mail is expected to continue to pour in until the first of the year.

Post office windows for receiving, distributing and mailing packages, and for buying stamps, which are usually closed Saturday at 12 noon, were open this afternoon as long as the public needed service.

The volume of in-coming Christmas mail this morning indicates that there will be deliveries Sunday. If the steady trips of carriers fail to make a dent in the huge pile of parcels arriving today, Sunday deliveries are assured, Burt E. Hawkins, postmaster stated.

Sing Program Will Be Held

The congregation will sing the closing hymn "Silent Night," and Santa Claus will visit the children, concluding the 1945 Christmas program.

Troop Planes To Leave Great Falls

SEATTLE, Dec. 22 (P) — The port of embarkation reported the two giant C-97 troop carrier planes which were ground-bound at Great Falls, Mont., are expected to leave there for Seattle today to pick up some 100 soldiers each and fly them back to the midwest immediately.

The big ships should have reached here Thursday, in a try to get the veterans home by Christmas, but weather conditions grounded them at the Montana base. Current plans call for the planes to take off here at noon today.

Straus Heads Reclamation

Michael W. Straus resigned his position recently as first assistant secretary of the interior, President Truman announced, to take the appointment as U. S. commissioner of the U. S. bureau of reclamation. The appointment was effective December 12.

Another note of interest from the bureau was the announcement of Secretary Ickes, that American federal engineers will prepare designs and specifications for a Yangtze river control project. A dam which will dwarf Grand Coulee and have a reservoir 250 miles long will be built at Ichang.

In addition the plan calls for other dams, hundreds of miles of irrigation canals and the world's largest hydro-electric plant.

Two Klamath Men Attend Safety Confab

Klamath Falls was represented at the second annual Oregon Industrial Safety conference held at Salem Thursday and Friday by W. B. Whitcomb and Norman R. Hansen of the Di Giorgio Fruit corporation.

The conference was conducted by the accident prevention division of the state industrial accident commission, all sessions except the Thursday evening dinner meeting being held at the state capitol building.

A program was based on a practical approach to Oregon's industrial accident problem. The delegates in attendance were divided into four groups, each group attending each of the four special panel discussion meetings which took up a direct attack on outstanding causes of accidents in Oregon. It was shown that over 20 per cent of Oregon's industrial accidents resulted in an eye injury and specific eye protective equipment was shown which eliminates the hazards to be found in industry. Other panel sessions discussed cause analysis, slips and falls, and general protective equipment.

The conference was in charge of Robert M. Evenden, director of the division. Others participating in the program included L. H. McGuire of the United States bureau of mines, Dr. O. R. Chambers, Oregon State college, Walter Gillard, Kenneth Flocke, Paul E. Gurske, chairman of the commission, L. E. Arens, commissioner, and Ralph W. Emmons, commission administrator.
