Don't forget that it's Attlee who is the master chemist in this leftist politico-economic experiment which, if it should go wrong, would have a tremendous repercussion not only on England but on the rest of the globe.

4000 Students Out Of Classrooms

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 22 (AP)—Approximately 4000 students in 27 Clark county schools have been forced to stay away from classes because of the flu epidemic and dangerous icy road conditions.

Officially reported 225 students and 18 teachers are ill at Camas schools which have been closed, and treacherous highways, slowing and stopping school buses were responsible for most of the other closures.
