I do not know how it seems to you, but to my way of thinking, this Christmas of 1945 has brought humanity closer to an ideal of universal, world-wide peace than any I can remember.

We are closer to that ideal of mutual respect and tolerance and unity than at any time since the Prince of Peace Himself framed beside the Sea of Galilee.

True, this desire for universal peace has been largely brought about by fear—fear of that obliterating weapon known as the Atomic Bomb. And the lion among the nations who lies down with the lamb may do so only because he is afraid the lamb may have a heavy charge of Uranium and Plutonium hidden about him somewhere.

Maybe some such fear was necessary to bring mankind to its senses. We obey the law through fear of the consequences of disobedience, we do not go about insulting people simply because we fear reprisals in the shape of blows. I think perhaps the fear of an unpleasant hereafter has brought quite as many souls to Christianity as a desire to follow in the footsteps of the Gentle Christ.

And surely Fear never served so noble a purpose as now when fear of war seems to be driving us, shuddering in dread, to the world peace which we should, long ago, have created out of that simplest of all Christ's teachings, the Golden Rule.
