In Italy, she explained, it's the good St. Stephano who is honored on January 6, when gifts are drawn from the Urn of Fate. December 13 is Santa Lucia Day, which is also an important day in Sweden when the Festival of Light is celebrated. In Denmark and Germany on this day, the girls ask to have their future husbands revealed to them.

Mrs. Wissenbach told her audience that the Yule log tradition comes from their Scandinavian ancestors to the English speaking people. A log is brought into the house on Christmas eve with ceremony and chanting. In some sections of France the log is sprinkled with holy water. Christmas day in France is exclusively for children, said Mrs. Wissenbach, and in speaking of the use of decorated pines or cedars in our homes, stated that this is generally believed of German origin.
