

# Disaster Overtakes Both Touring Oregon Quintets

## Orangemen Drop First Road Game

CHICAGO, Dec. 22 (AP)—Oregon State college went down to a 50-40 defeat by powerful DePaul university last night in the first game of the Beavers' road trip.

Oregon State trailed throughout their half of a double-header, which also saw Northwestern university edge Western Michigan, 47-46. The event drew 9,029 fans.

DePaul took the situation in hand after two minutes of play and ran up a 35-12 count at half time, then coasted to an easy decision through the last 20 minutes.

Oregon State, with big Red Rocha clinging to DePaul's ace, George Mikan, like a leech, never was ahead, and the only time the Beavers were in the game was after a minute and a half of play when the score was tied at 2-2. DePaul then ran the count up to 16-4 after eight minutes of play.

The Beavers held Mikan's scoring to 22 points, one of his lowest totals of the season.

Oregon State's only real scoring spurt came early in the second half when the Demons, apparently over-confident, paid little attention to defense. The Beavers quickly ran the score to 35-24 before DePaul could get underway again, but after that there was little doubt of the outcome.

Forward Ted Henningsen was high man for the Westerners, with 13 points. Gene Slump, with 12, trailed Mikan for DePaul's scoring honors.

## Arkies Hire Tennessee Grid Coach

LITTLE ROCK, Dec. 22 (AP)—John Barnhill, who fashioned two bowl teams in four years for the University of Tennessee, will take his single wingback-balanced line recipe to the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville January 1.

Barnhill yesterday accepted an offer from the Arkansas trustees for \$10,000 annually for five years to take control of Razorback football fortunes—mediocre since the late 1930's. He will be athletic director and head football coach—the same position he has held since 1941 at Tennessee.

The new coach, a Tennessee star 20 years ago, succeeds Glen Rose, who stepped down after a disastrous 1945 season. Rose was elected to a five-year term as athletic business manager at \$4,000-a-year.

The trustees announced that George Cole, chief Razorback grid scout, would be an assistant to Barnhill.

Barnhill said Herbert "Deek" Brackett of Knoxville, Tenn., Vol. quarterback in 1931-38, would be his backfield coach.

Barnhill's selection climaxed a two-months search for an Arkansas coach. The 1945 legislature previously authorized the trustees to pay up to \$12,500 annually for a coach.

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## Ohio State Power Beats Duck Squad

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 22 (AP)—Ohio State was minus two regulars, but still strong enough to whip the barnstorming University of Oregon cagers, 57-42, last night.

It put the Oregon Webfoots on the short side of a 3-1 win-loss record in their current transcontinental tour.

The Bucks played without the services of Guard Warren Ameling, ill with the flu, and Forward Bob Bowen, now in Toledo completing the job of being discharged from the navy. Bowen was Ohio State's leading scorer in the first three games of the season but Ray Snyder, midjet forward, took over the scoring chores ably last night and tallied 22 points.

The Webfoots jumped out in front and made quite a game of it for half the first period before the combination of Snyder and Wayne Wells got hot and pulled the Bucks away.

In those first minutes the score was tied four times and the lead changed hands four times until there was 13 to 13 deadlock. Snyder poured in a one-hander to put Ohio State out in front. Arnold Risen connected for a free throw. Twice more Snyder hit from the field, once from under the basket and once on a one-hander from out in the foul circle and Wells came along to loop in a one-hander and give Ohio State a 22 to 13 lead.

Bob Hamilton dropped in a free throw for the Webfoots and then Wells banged in two long ones and it was no contest from there on in.

## Gale Bishop Plans To Return To WSC

Klamath Falls overwhelmed Weed, California's "A" squad 51-21 last night. Grants Pass edged a narrow 32-31 victory over Cottage Grove.

Roseburg and Eureka's "A" squads, both defeated in opening play, scored victories last night.

—Roseburg 45-22 over Eureka "B," and Eureka "A" 42-32 over Weed "B." Both the California schools entered two teams in the tournament's class A division.
