Pels Clutch Grants Pass Cage Laurels

Klamath's Pelicans outlasted all opposition in the Rogue River valley basketball tournament to cop the meet's A division laurels at Grants Pass Saturday night. The Pelicans finished with a thumping 50-21 victory over Grants Pass.

That was the third straight win for the K-men in the tournament. The others were over Eureka 63-22 and Weed 51-21. The Pelicans now have won seven games and lost one for the season's record.

Joe Peak and Hip Largent took the KUHS boys into the Grants Pass territory, subbing for Coach Dutch French who is laid up with an injured leg received in a scrimmage game at the high school.

Reedsport captured the "B" division with a lopsided 69-14 score over Glendale.

Other final night scores: "A" division: Cottage Grove 37, Weed 31, Eureka 32, Roseburg 31, Weed "B" 35, Eureka "B" 17.

"B" division: Grants Pass Junior Varsity 30, Grants Pass Wildcats 24, Medford "B" 46, Central Point 29, Kerby 23, Prospect 17.

Grants Pass and Klamath Falls battled on fairly even terms during the first half of the title clash but the Pelicans really poured it on in the last half while holding the Cavemen to only 5 points in the final two cantos. Halftime count was 22 to 16 in favor of Klamath Falls.

The GP boys managed to bottle the Pelican ace scorer, Palmer, but the other Klamath boys found the range to run up the score. Palmer and Lutz each tallied 12 counters apiece for scoring honors in the game. Palmer had scored 46 points in the previous two games for a 23-point average.

Individual scoring honors for the day and for the tournament, however, go to DeWitt of Reedsport who chalked up a total of 88 points before leaving the game when the Reedsport coach decided to give one of his bench warmers a little experience during the final three minutes of the game.

Cougars Win Over British Columbia

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 24 (AP)—Washington State's basketball team bounced back after a defeat of last week to grab a 52-44 victory over the University of British Columbia here last night.

Skill at the free throw line told the story. The Cougars netted 12 out of 20 chances with the Thunderbirds managing to make good on only four of 12.

UBC led 22-21 at the half, but field goals by Gene Siverson and Ray Johnson put Washington State ahead after the intermission and the Cougars stayed there.

Sandy Robertson of the Thunderbirds was high in points, with 14. Siverson got 12 to lead the Cougar attack.

Ducks Drop Final Game Of Journey

BOWLING GREEN, O., Dec. 24 (AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team was easy prey for Bowling Green university here Saturday night, as the Falcons' first string played only 20 minutes to start the club on the way to a 78-36 victory.

It was Bowling Green's 10th win of the season.

Oregon used a zone defense for the first seven minutes in which the Falcons drove into a 16-4 lead. A man-for-man style of play served the westerners no better and, with the Falcon second string on the floor, the half ended 42-18.

The first string took over again at the start of the second half and outscored the Webfoots 17-1, turning the game over to the Bowling Green second and third stringers at 59-19.

Guard Tom Inman of the Falcons was high point man, with 18. Capt. Bob Hamilton, with 10, was the top Oregon point getter.

The Webfoots will return to Eugene today after the not-too-prosperous eastern and midwest tour to face a four-game schedule opening Wednesday in Portland against the Northwest Insulators.

Fee's powerful independent five is scheduled for Thursday at Portland and twin games are listed at Astoria over the weekend against the Seattle Coast Guard.

Quarantined Vets To Have Holiday Party

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 24 (AP)—A Christmas party was set today for 1763 Pacific veterans quarantined aboard the troopship Grundy here because one of the servicemen has smallpox.

The army planned to serve turkey dinner aboard ship and conduct a holiday carol sing on the decks beside a Christmas tree carrying Red Cross gift boxes.

Santa Claus will board ship, but first will be vaccinated, the army port of embarkation authorities reported.

Yesterday the servicemen shared a Christmas program when a harbor tug anchored 30 yards off the quarantined vessel while Red Cross workers and a girls' college group sang carols. The Vancouver barracks band played the latest hit tunes while the GIs yelled their gratitude from the Grundy's decks.

The men will be allowed to come ashore tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock when the quarantine is lifted. Officials said that because the vessel lost a day crossing the international date-line the ban would be lifted a day earlier than first planned.

Man Captured; Admits Murder

HOLLAND, Mich., Dec. 24 (AP)—Sheriff William M. Boeve of Ottawa county announced today he had been informed by the federal bureau of investigation that Robert Frederic Smith, 21, had been captured at Blue Island, Ill., and that he confessed to killing Roy Gordon Beh of Grosse Pointe, Mich.

Sheriff Boeve said the FBI had informed him that Smith, who escaped from Camp Robinson, Arkansas, on December 14, shot and killed Beh in a struggle.

Later, Sheriff H. E. Driese of Berrien county reported that he had received a "radio flash" from the FBI saying that Smith had confessed to killing Beh, who lived next door to Henry Ford II, and was western Michigan sales representative for a Newark, N. J. aircraft equipment firm.

Willamette River May Be Seaplane Base

PORTLAND, Dec. 24 (AP)—Permission to use the Willamette river for a seaplane landing strip, which would give Portland its first seaplane base, was asked today by the Rainbow Airways here.

T. P. Mannan, Rainbow Airways president, and R. G. Sturges, chief pilot, stated in their petition that the area between Ross island and the Hawthorne bridge has been approved by local aeronautics inspectors for seaplane use by private operators. The firm plans hangars and offices at the foot of Montgomery street.

UO Students Warned Of Housing Shortage

EUGENE, Dec. 24 (AP)—Students planning to enroll at the University of Oregon for the winter term were warned today not to report to the campus until they have reserved sleeping accommodations.

Officials said the housing shortage has become so acute there is no available space to be had for emergency needs.
