

Foreign Ministers Confab Draws To Close; Final Communique Expected

MOSCOW, Dec. 26 (AP)—The foreign ministers of the United States, Russia and Great Britain met this afternoon to clear up the last few details of their conference, hoping to complete by night agreements on a number of details.

They gathered at Speridionika Palace at 2:30 p. m. (3:30 a. m. PST). Agreements were reported reached on main questions. Informants said the area of agreement was greater than anyone, including perhaps the ministers, had hoped when they met.

The hour of issuance of the final communique was doubtful. A British informant said yesterday the bulletin would be issued at 2 a. m. tomorrow (3 p. m. today PST), but latest indications were that no definite time had been set.

French assent to the procedure on drafting peace treaties for European states still was awaited. The French had indicated, however, they would not object. China already has agreed to the formula.

Bidault Out
Secretary of State James F. Byrnes telephoned the French foreign office Monday afternoon, but was informed that Foreign Minister Georges Bidault was out. It was not announced whether Bidault had called back. One of the issues that broke down the earlier conference of foreign ministers in London was French insistence on being a party to all European peace treaties.

Diplomatic sources said the atmosphere of futility which prevailed after the breakdown of the London conferences of Byrnes, Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov and Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin has been eliminated and the Big Three now were reunited in a spirit of collaboration.

The conferees were said to have struck up a more intimate acquaintance between themselves, producing a real measure of admiration for one another.

The three foreign ministers already have reached an accord on the procedure for drafting the European peace settlement.

Authoritative quarters said U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes was highly pleased with the results of his discussions with Soviet Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin.

Much Achieved
Far more has been achieved, these quarters said, than was even contemplated when Byrnes left Washington. The full extent of the agreements reached was not indicated, but one of Byrnes' aides said the results would not be disappointing.

One of the accords was said to deal with control of Japan, which was high on the list of complicated problems on the agenda. Whether an agreement was reached on the number one problem, control of atomic energy, remained a matter of speculation.

It was reported, however, that the three foreign ministers had discussed the American-British-Canadian policy on world control of atomic energy during their meeting.

Another important question on the agenda was the withdrawal of British, American and Russian troops from Iran, but the outcome of discussions of this problem also was undiscussed.

The already-announced accord on procedure for drafting European treaties, regarded by observers as close to the compromise formula proposed by Byrnes at the five power foreign ministers' conference in London, has been submitted to France and China for their approval.

China was reported to have approved the agreement already, but no word has been received from the French government.

Police Probe Man's Death

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 26 (AP)—The slaying of Walter Howard Poole, Vancouver, Wash. shipyard worker, and part-time butcher whose bullet-marked body was found in Vanport yesterday, was under investigation today.

Sheriff's Captain Ard Pratt said the victim was last seen alive when he left work at 11:00 p. m. Christmas Eve from the Janzen Beach food market.

Investigators said Poole apparently had been tossed out of a car after being robbed. A billfold, which the widow reported should have contained about \$200, was missing.

The body was discovered by Cecil Porter, Gresham, yesterday in front of a partially dismantled unit on one of the war housing center's abandoned streets. Capt. Pratt said a night watchman reported passing the spot at 6:00 a. m. but did not notice the body.

The widow and two children, ages 14 and 11, survive. Poole lived in McLoughlin Heights, Vancouver.

SEND DELEGATES

Navy To Lend Assistance At Crater Lake Park In Study Of Volcanic Action

The United States navy will assist Crater Lake park service and the U. S. geological survey in investigation of possible volcanic activity at Klamath county's major scenic attraction, according to word from E. P. Leavitt, park superintendent.

A portable acoustical recorder will be supplied by the navy

for the use of F. W. Cater, geologist, who plans to lower the apparatus into the lake to determine automatically any disturbances with frequency as low as 10 per second.

This recorder operates with dry batteries. The navy has designed the equipment to meet the needs of this investigation and has offered to devise additional equipment if necessary.

It is the navy's plan to drop the equipment on the rim by parachute if it cannot be transported there by surface vehicle under snow conditions.

The park service, however, has ordered a Sno-Cat from the Tucker company at Grass Valley, Calif., and this will probably be used in getting equipment and supplies to the lake.

Hazardous
Leavitt said that the projected attempt to lower the acoustical recorder into the waters of the lake with a cable leading up the crater wall to Crater Lake lodge, where the observation station will be established, is fraught with hazards.

He said he must yet determine whether any park employees will be permitted to work within the crater wall this winter. The crater trail was partially destroyed by a storm last year, and any attempts to go up or down the wall will be extremely dangerous, Leavitt stated.

Carlisle Crouch, chief ranger of the park now on leave in the service, is expected back on his job in January, and will help in working out details of the proposed investigation.

Cater has arrived in southern Oregon and has set up his headquarters in the U. S. geological survey office at Grants Pass.

Gleason, who had appeared in "All Quiet on the Western Front" and many other films, landed on a second floor extension, police said. He had been attached to the army signal corps photo center here. He had been in good spirits shortly before his death, police said they were told by his friends.

Allied Group Off To Japan For Look-See

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Nursing ambitions at policy-making rather than mere advice-giving, the allied Far Eastern commission leaves today for Japan and a look-see at Gen. Douglas MacArthur's administration.

Weather permitting, commission members will board a plane here at 4:15 p. m. (PST). After flying to Pearl Harbor, they will complete the trip on the USS Mt. McKinley, a navy command ship. They expect to return to Washington about February 15.

The 10-nation commission made it plain in two months of deliberations in Washington that it does not expect to find any grave fault with the way MacArthur has administered Japan. Most commission members have said they believe the supreme commander has done a creditable job.

Study Directives
What the commissioners will do is study carefully how United States directives to MacArthur have been carried out.

Up to now, the commission has devoted most of its time to debating the directives themselves. A basic policy committee under leadership of Australia's foreign minister, Herbert V. Evatt, has rewritten the original White House directives to MacArthur, issued shortly after the Japanese surrender.

This document now has been forwarded to the 10 governments for consideration. If approved, it will be forwarded to MacArthur. U. S. officials say this government would have no objection, because the rewrite seeks only to "tighten up" and clarify the instructions.

Some members, however, believe the time is approaching when the commission should take over the actual power to formulate policy for Japan; that once the strictly military phase of the occupation is over, the commission should move to Japan and issue its own instructions directly to MacArthur.

The view brought about the quiet dropping of the word "advisory" from the commission's title in recent communications.

Prime Minister Peter Fraser of New Zealand said during a visit to Washington Monday that the time had come when "much greater powers should be entrusted to the commission." And Evatt recently asserted it had become clear that "the commission will determine the general lines of allied policies in Japan."

Death Claims Adm. Keyes
LONDON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Admiral of the Fleet Lord Keyes, one of Britain's outstanding naval heroes and leader of the spectacular Zebrugge raid in the first World War, died in his sleep today at the age of 73. He had been ill three weeks.

Adm. Keyes was admitted with a large part of the success of combating the German submarine menace in World War I, and as commander of the Dover patrol he organized the famous St. George's Day operation which sealed up the Bruges canal in 1918.

Retired in 1935, he returned to active service in 1940 after serving as a conservative member of parliament. As director of combined operations in 1940 and 1941, he was one of the sponsors of the commandos.

His son, Lt. Col. Geoffrey C. T. Keyes, was killed in 1941 while leading a commando raid on the Marshes of the North Sea.

Son of the late Gen. Sir Charles Keyes, he was Baron of Zebrugge and of Dover. He entered the navy in 1885 at the age of 13, became a commander in 1900 and rose to the rank of admiral of the fleet in 1930.

"Glass Eye" Will Learn Fate Thursday

YOKOHAMA, Dec. 26 (AP)—An American military war crimes trial commission late today took under advisement the allied case against Tatsuo Tsuchiya, alias "Little Glass Eye," and is expected to announce a verdict tomorrow.

In his closing argument, Major Louis Geffen of the prosecution staff contended that the case "is very simple—a violation of the rules of land warfare forbidding any form of cruelty to prisoners." He again demanded the death penalty.

As the commission began its deliberations in the case, the first of its kind in the Japanese homeland—it was announced hearings would be conducted later in the week for two more defendants, one of whom was charged with directing the slaying of an American prisoner.

Fatal Beating
Tsuchiya was accused of fatally beating PFC Robert Gordon Teas of Streator, Ill., a survivor of the Bataan "death march" who died in the Mitsuhashi prison camp.

Lt. Col. John Dickinson of St. Petersburg, La., chief defense counsel, told the commission there was no competent evidence

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to prove Tsuchiya guilty and he asserted the defendant had not been given a fair trial or "what we know as such in Anglo-Saxon law."

Dickinson charged that the defendant was tried by prosecution rules. Geffen objected and said the rules were promulgated by the supreme allied commander.

Two Statements
The prosecution emphasized two statements, one of them a deposition by Squadron Leader David Grant of the RAF introduced today which said Teas was in sick quarters suffering from malnutrition and dysentery March 3, 1943. Grant said Teas was caught with several tins of Red Cross food, which had been hidden in a shed by the Japanese guards.

The RAF airman continued that he tried to tell a Cpl. Yoshizawa that Teas was suffering from kleptomania and should be given consideration. Yoshizawa, he said, ordered the American to stand on a bed while Tsuchiya struck him repeatedly across the face with a knotted rope and Tsuchiya jabbed Teas in the stomach with a stick.

ANCHORAGE, Dec. 26 (AP)—A \$75,000 fire burned out three families homes but injured no one last night when flames destroyed living quarters and Glovers Super Service garage here.

The fire started when an oil furnace exploded in the basement of the building.

One of the tenants, Mr. S. L. Cannon, saved \$10,000 worth of securities and bonds. Other people living in the premises lost all their possessions in the fire.

3 Men Admit Taking Logger "For A Ride"

ALBANY, Ore., Dec. 26 (AP)—Sheriff Mike Southard said today that three men charged here with a \$28,000 burglary admitted taking a Kelso, Wash. logger "for a ride" and dumping his body into a stream.

The logger, Ernest Bowman, 45, has been missing since December 18. A car which Southard said, was used by the trio for safe-cracking jobs, bore bloodstained upholstery and had a bullet hole through the windshield.

Sheriff's officials, accompanied by two members of the trio, spent Christmas night vainly hunting the body along a stream about 20 miles south of Camp Adair.

The sheriff said all three men admitted complicity in the slaying after one of them accused another of the actual shooting. He did not disclose a motive.

The trio, formally charged with burglary, are S. D. McLain, alias Douglas O'Day, 59, Portland; Roy Moore, 55, Portland; and Jack Mann, 27, Corvallis, Ore. The sheriff said both McLain and Moore have criminal records.

The "ride" tale was first told by Mann, who the sheriff said, accused McLain of shooting the logger. McLain was quoted by the sheriff as saying "We are all involved. . . . We dropped the body from a small wooden bridge the morning of December 18. . . . I am anxious to get this thing over with."
