Santiam Junction—Raining lightly, 32 degrees. 72 inches snow at summit. Both North and South Santiam highways are normal except for two miles of light packed snow between mileposts 79 and 81.

Odell Lake—Snowing lightly, 30 degrees. Slush and packed snow east of milepost 57. Chains advised.

Medford—No snow on Pacific highway through Siskiyou or on Green Springs highway. Raining lightly in mountains.

The Dalles—All roads bare of ice and snow. Meacham—Packed snow, which is well sanded, from milepost 250 to 275.

Klamath Falls—Three inches of snow fell last night on Quartz mountain. Green Springs highway in good shape.

La Grande—Roads icy but thawing. Baker—Roads icy. Burns—Storming, 9 inches of new snow. Packed snow, ice and slush on all roads.
