

# Truman to Use Both Television And Radio Direct-To-People Appeal For Action On Stalled Legislature

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—President Truman turned to Washington today for a cruise on the Potomac, ready to carry his fight for his legislative program direct to the people both by radio and television.

The presidential yacht Williamsburg docked here this morning. The president had breakfast aboard, after she docked at the navy yard, then drove to the White House.

Mr. Truman speaks at 7 p. m., (PT) tomorrow on radio networks in his first direct-to-nation appeal to get loose in 1946 the chunks bulky congress placed in 19 under his 21-point legislative program.

And on January 10 he will go before congress in person to deliver the first television presidential message. This is expected to be an elaborate five-hour Sunday night speech which White House aides have dubbed as an "over-all report to the nation."

**Date Announced**

The January 15 of the day after congress reconvenes, was announced last night in New York by the American Telephone and Telegraph company. The White House is indicated Mr. Truman would deliver his message in person. It had not made it definite it had any date been mentioned previously.

Workmen have been installing television equipment in the capitol for several days.

The A. T. and T. will broadcast the images and sounds of the president's scenes both at the White House and the capitol. Will be telecast by three New York television stations and a Washington station.

The president has spent the past four days and nights writing his speech and relaxing aboard the yacht Williamsburg on the cold, gray Potomac river.

**Ice and Fog**

Because of ice and fog the yacht's skipper did not take her the 100 miles to Chesapeake bay as originally planned. Last night the yacht anchored nearby Mt. Vernon after having her previous anchorage of Quantico, Va., at 3 p. m.

Except for tax reason, limited government reorganization authority and a state administrator for surplus property, congress left Mr. Truman's domestic legislative program various stages of frustration when it went home before Christmas.

Mr. Truman is expected to go to the plate swings tomorrow night for most if not all of his remaining proposals.

## 4000 Inquiries Handled By Vets Administration Since Office Was Set Up

The local veterans administration office has handled 4000 inquiries regarding veterans' affairs since it was activated March 27, 1945, Patrick W. Kilby, officer in charge, states.

"The veterans' hospital, recently granted for Klamath Falls, was definitely assured," Kilby said, "by the number of veterans applying for hospital benefits through the local office, furnishing evidence of the need here."

Kilby further stated, "Klamath Falls is one of the leading centers in the state and ranks high in the nation for having adequate facilities for the care of veterans and their dependents. This is due to the citizens being fully conscious of veterans problems and also to the immediate action taken to improve weak spots in the veterans rehabilitation program."

Kilby extends appreciation to all organizations and individuals for their "splendid support and co-operation" in this program.

"Although the job is only half finished because only half the veterans are home, continued co-operation will make the veterans being discharged glad to return to this area," he said.

The local office, the first of its kind to be established in Oregon is now officially designated as a sub-regional office due to the increased service being rendered regarding veterans' affairs. The staff has recently been increased with the assignment of Zeno Dent who will attend to affairs of veterans' education, training and vocational rehabilitation.

Beverly Reed, recently discharged from the Waves has also been added to the staff to act in the capacity of clerk-stenographer.

## Jobless Benefits Set Monthly Record

SALEM, Jan. 2 (AP)—Unemployment benefits in Oregon established an all-time monthly record in December of \$1,590,700, the state unemployment compensation commission said today.

Of that amount, \$372,177 was paid to returned veterans. The \$1,218,523 paid to laid-off civilians was about \$100,000 higher than in November.

State benefits during 1945 totaled \$2,802,104, almost 18 times the amount paid in 1944, and more than for any year since 1940, when the total was \$4,099,925.

Almost a third of the active claimants in 1945 were women.
