## Palato Denies Rape Charge

Appearing in circuit court this morning with an interpreter, Pedro Palato, young Mexican national, entered a plea of not guilty to statutory rape.

His trial was set for February 25. Judge David R. Vandenberg asked the questions necessary for the arraignment, directing his queries in English to Epifanio Rodriguez, Palato's interpreter. She would then repeat the question in Spanish to Palato.

The first question was whether or not Palato understood the charges against him. The youth and his interpreter conversed together quickly, then she told the judge he understood the indictment, was not guilty and had never had anything to do with the young Mexican girl he is accused of raping.
