Repeal Of Federal Taxes Explained

The Klamath office of internal revenue has received many inquiries about the effect of the revenue act of 1945 on miscellaneous taxes.

The only federal taxes which have been entirely repealed are the \$5 auto tax stamp effective July 1, 1946; the use tax stamp on boats, effective July 1, 1946, and the capital stock tax, effective July 1, 1946.

This means that any car or boat put in use between now and June 30, 1946, is liable for the use tax for the period beginning with the month in which it is placed in use and ending June 30, 1946.

All retail dealers' excise taxes are still in effect with no change in the rates of tax.

When any other taxes are repealed, a notice will be placed in the paper, the office advised today.
