

New Snow Makes Chains Necessary At All Mountain Passes In Oregon

SALEM, Jan. 7 (AP)—New snow has made chains necessary at all mountain passes, the state highway commission said today, while most eastern Oregon points reported that snow fell last night.

The daily road report:

Government Camp—Snowing, 30 degrees. Forty-six inches total snow cover. Packed snow and ice throughout with slush at east end, between mileposts 21 and 26. Two inches new snow last night.

Santiam Junction—Snowing hard, 32 degrees. Four inches new snow last night. Roads

throughout section are packed, snow at higher elevations and slush at lower elevations. Slippery. Chains absolutely necessary.

Odell Lake—Still one-way traffic above Oakridge on Willamette highway. Snowing hard intermittently, with high winds, 25 degrees. Packed snow east of milepost 55. Four inches new snow. Chains advised.

Siskiyou Summit on Pacific Highway—Snowing hard from milepost 330 to beyond state line. Road in bad condition, very slick. Ten inches of new snow on Pacific highway and on route 66. 24 degrees. Chains required.

Baker—Snowing, one-half inch of new snow last night.

Bend—Snowing hard, 23 inches of new snow last night at Lapine. Snow beginning to drift.

Ochoco Highway—Service creek-Mitchell section opened today.

Burns—Three inches of new snow, still snowing.

John Day—Snowing lightly, one-half inch of new snow. One-way traffic north of Service creek.

Austin—Nine inches of new snow, snowing hard.

Wilsonville Ferry—Closed by high water.

Bellevue-Hopewell Highway—Closed by high water.

Albany-Corvallis East Side Highway—Closed by high water.

Enlistments In Navy High

Voluntary enlistments after V-J Day in the U. S. navy are equal to wartime enlistments according to A. C. Friesen, in charge of the Klamath Falls recruiting station. Although enlistments were on a limited quota basis during five months of 1945, 153 men were enlisted in general naval service, 17 were enlisted as aircrewmen, and 14 as radio technicians during the year. Thirty-six men were rejected for physical and other reasons. All applicants are checked through police and juvenile authorities as no men with court records are accepted. Enlistments in the regular navy are now open to men from 17 to 30 for two, three, four or six-year terms. Men from 17 to 35 may enlist in the naval reserve for the duration of the emergency plus six months.

Men may re-enlist with their former rating within 90 days after being honorably discharged. Men honorably discharged from the army, marines, or coast guard, and physically qualified, are also accepted.

The local recruiting station is open daily, except Sunday, from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.
