

U. S. Delegation To UNO Meet Seals Breach Over Safeguards For Atomic

LONDON, Jan. 9 (AP)—A breach in the United States delegation over safeguards for atomic energy secrets was sealed today at a conference on the eve of the opening of the United Nations organization assembly.

Secretary of State Byrnes conferred two hours with the American delegates this morning and

said later that so far as he knew, his view of the safeguards was entirely acceptable to all.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), a leader of the critics, said he had been completely reassured upon two points which he had considered of paramount importance: That adequate security arrangements would precede disclosures concerning atomic matters and that "any plan recommended by the atomic commission must receive congressional approval in the United States."

The secretary said the United States, Britain, Russia and Canada were agreed on safeguards for atomic energy secrets under whatever control plan was devised by the UNO.

Byrnes issued a statement on the atomic energy controversy within the American delegation shortly after holding a two-hour session with the delegates and said that, so far as he knew, his

view on the safeguards was entirely acceptable to all of them.

Immediately afterward Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), a critic of Byrnes' atomic energy policy up to this point, issued a statement saying he now was "completely reassured."

Harmony Restored

Thus harmony was restored to the American delegation on the eve of tomorrow's historic first session of the United Nations assembly at Central Hall.

The controversy over atomic energy revolved around a proposal by the Big Three powers and Canada, which also had French and Chinese support, that the United Nations should create a commission to work out atomic energy controls.

Vandenberg had assailed what he privately called the vague language of the proposal as endangering American atomic secrets. Byrnes had contended all along that the United States would never have to give out any information it did not want to.

Byrnes began his statement today with a reference to reports in the London morning newspapers that he had conferred with Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin on atomic energy last night.

Byrnes said that in the 90 minutes or more he spent with Bevin last night the subject of atomic energy did not come up. He also reported that he had not discussed it with Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov since the Big Three foreign ministers meeting in Moscow.

He said that his assurance that there was no misunderstanding among the powers on this point was based on the views expressed during the Moscow conference.

The secretary said he intended to stay in London until the United Nations organization was well under way. He said the first meeting should be limited strictly to organizational problems.

Reports came from several diplomatic quarters that Paul Henri Spaak, socialist foreign minister of Belgium, had been agreed upon as president of the assembly.

The election of a president is the first item on the agenda after the opening addresses of Eduardo Zuleta Angel, president of the preparatory commission, and Prime Minister Attlee of Great Britain.

SALEM, Jan. 9 (AP)—Conditions on Oregon's mountain highways were improved today, with road crews getting a chance to carry on sanding operations because the snow stopped falling.

The state highway commission's daily road report:

Odell Lake—Clear, 9 degrees. Packed snow on Willamette highway east of milepost 53. Sanding crew operating. Total snow at summit 105 inches, no new snow. Still one-way traffic between Oakridge and the summit.

Siskiyou summit on Pacific highway—cloudy and windy, 20 degrees. Three miles of packed snow on highway. Very slick and icy, but sanding.

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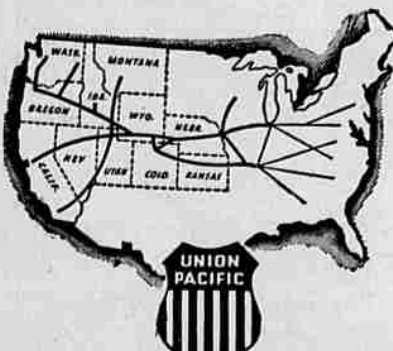
