

Higher Butter, Meat Prices Clash With Hold-The-Line Cost Program

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—Officially advanced proposals for higher butter and meat prices collided today with government efforts to hold the line on food costs.

The butter hike—18 cents a pound by May 1—was reported to have been recommended by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson. Aides of the cabinet officer said he advanced the suggestion in a move to encourage production. Butter has been becoming increasingly hard to find in many parts of the country.

Anderson previously spoke out in favor of higher ceiling prices on meats in an effort to avert next Wednesday's scheduled strike in the meat packing industry.

Behind these pressures on the government's hold-the-line policy is a demand for all kinds of food much stronger than many officials had anticipated. Agriculture department economists attribute the demand to continuing shortages of such non-food goods as autos, radios and the like.

Force Subsidies
One result of these pressures may be to force the administration to continue its \$1,785,000, 000-a-year food subsidy beyond the June 30 date it had planned to bring it to a halt. This program was inaugurated during the war to prevent increases in civilian food prices.

Meat packers already are being paid subsidies to permit them to operate without loss at present price ceilings. They contend, however, that they cannot meet wage demands unless they can get more for their meat. The increase in butter prices—reportedly recommended to Stabilization Chief John C. Collett—would be designed to place buttermakers in a position to compete with makers of other dairy products. Under present price regulations, more money can be made by diverting butterfat into cream, ice cream and some other dairy items.

Because of this situation, butter production has dropped below prewar output despite the fact that milk production continues at peak levels.

Butter prices rose 5 cents last November when a subsidy was withdrawn.

January 15 Tax Questions Answered By U. S. Experts

- Suppose I am one of the taxpayers who must file a declaration of estimated tax on January 15, how do I estimate my tax for last year? Estimate your income for 1945 and then figure the tax by the same method you use to compute your exact tax on your annual return.
- Are there any worksheets or tables to help me estimate? You don't need any special sheets. Use a copy of the regular return blank, form 1040.
- If I use the regular return blank, form 1040, to figure my tax, can I file that instead of an estimated form? If you fill it out like a regular return and use exact figures (not estimates), you can file form 1040, and it will serve both as the declaration due now and as the return due March 15.
- Part of my tax bill is paid through the tax deductions my employer makes from my paycheck. Do I have to pay the estimated tax on top of that? You pay only the difference between the withholding tax and your total tax.
- If I am changing an estimate and have already paid some installments, how do I take credit for those payments? If filing form 1040-ES, write the total amount of your payment on line 5. If filing form 1040, write the amount on line 7(B), page 1.
- Suppose my estimate last March was far too high, and I have already paid more than my correct tax for 1945. Can I get a refund of the difference? Yes, by filing your regular return and showing the amount of overpayment in line 9, page 1, form 1040.

HIGH SCHOOL News Notes and Comment

KUHNS hasn't always been the size nor the description that it is now. One of the examples of the changes that took place in the school several years ago is the dramatics department.

Ten years ago, what is now a well organized little theatre, was a greasy garage used for the maintenance of the Klamath school buses.

When the new right wing was placed on the school, the workshop was moved and then was begun the process of reconversion.

The new wing was begun in 1939 and soon after the buses were rolled out the job began in what was to become the Little Theatre off Mon Claire. The sum of \$700, which had been donated by Bert Hall, a local businessman, for the purpose of being used in some speech activity at the theatre along with some money taken from school taxes.

This was only the start and later more money was appropriated by the school board to help the project along. Last year money was given for the installation of electrical fixtures.

The Little Theatre, as it stands today, has a stage, paneled walls and a wooden tiered floor that provides for better seating arrangements. This year money was budgeted for heavy permanent chairs, but since these

are not yet available in the proper quality, the money is to be used for heavy velvet curtains and backdrops for the stage.

What is now the prop room used to be the old oil room; the office was the place of business of the vocational director, while the costume room held not fancy dress, but crude tools, and the small room leading to the stage was used as headquarters for the gym teachers.

Still more improvements are scheduled for the theatre. Some day it will boast a tile floor with carpets and upholstered seats. Most of the credit for what has been done goes to Mrs. B. B. Blomquist, dramatics teacher, who has been responsible for changing a greasy, stone garage into an attractive theatre.

And incidentally, it looks like the students of KUHNS can come to school in droves when they have to, because only 18 girls were absent from the school yesterday, and fewer boys. The lack of absenteeism was because of exams.

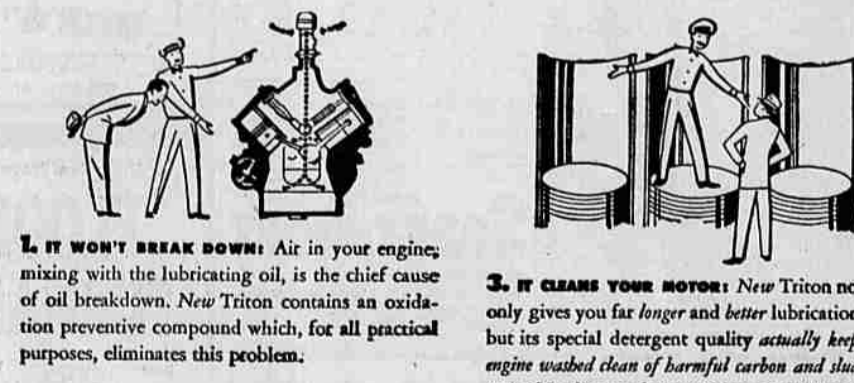
