Status Of 3 Men Received

Information concerning three other servicemen, whose status had not been changed following the cessation of hostilities, was received Wednesday by The Herald and News.

Dale Finley, who had been held a prisoner of the Germans, was liberated following V-E Day and is now at his home in Klamath Falls.

Another prisoner, Clinton Maxson, who was held by the Japanese for three and one-half years, was liberated shortly after V-J Day from a camp in Japan and is at his home in Chicago.

Maxson made his home in Klamath Falls for 22 months caring for the late Edmondson Leever, 516 Pine. Mrs. Leever said Wednesday that she heard

from Maxson at Christmas. He served in the coast guard and was taken prisoner in the Philippines.

Jack Patzke of Bly, who is listed as a prisoner of war of Germany, has not been heard from, according to unofficial information given this newspaper yesterday.

Those who remain on the missing or prisoner list are Ralph Gustavson, German prisoner; J. C. Crabb, missing over Germany; George B. Rhinevault, missing in Africa; W. B.
