FHA Urges Home Owners To Remodel

Property owners in Klamath Falls were urged today by Director Folger Johnson of the federal housing administration to cooperate with FHA in obtaining maximum use of existing structures by remodeling to help relieve the housing shortage, especially for returning veterans.

In accordance with instructions from Washington headquarters, the FHA in a move designed to provide additional living accommodations for returning veterans would resume insuring property improvement and rehabilitation loans on more convenient terms, he announced. Such loans may be for amounts up to \$5000 repayable in small monthly installments extending over a period as long as seven years.

The present policy of the FHA is directed toward encouragement of the private building industry to produce as many new dwelling units as possible as quickly as possible, particularly in low and medium brackets of both sales price and rentals.

But unless the best use is made of the existing construction by conversion and rehabilitation to provide additional living accommodations for veterans the housing problem will be made more intense and difficult of solution.

Johnson expressed the belief that substantial additions can be made to the housing supply with a minimum of delay by properly planned conversion or rehabilitation of existing structures.

Property owners desiring loans should consult their local lending institutions. As a means of aiding in this the FHA will insure such property improvement loans up to \$5000 for a term up to seven years under the following conditions:

The property must be in a "war housing area" which has been designated by the president.

The improvement must pro-

vide additional living accommodations. Occupancy priority must be given to veterans of World War II.

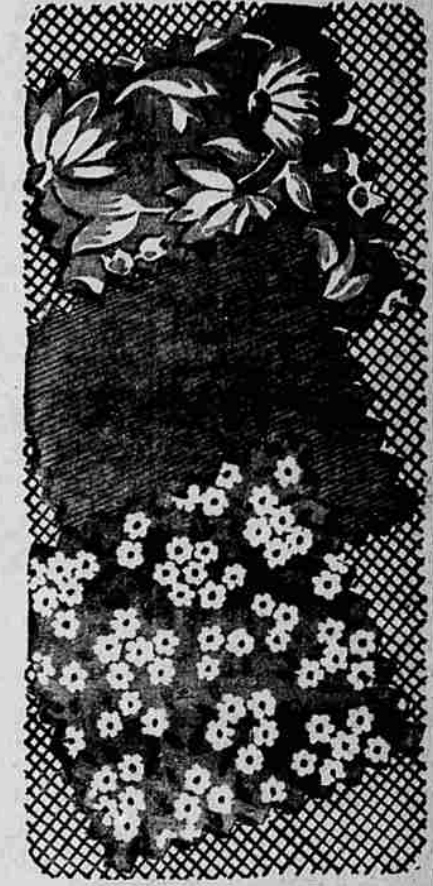

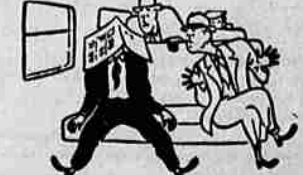
