

# City Fathers Seek More Information On Airport

An interim permit, submitted to the city council from the 13th naval district at Seattle and concerning the disposition of the naval air station, was by-passed by the fathers last night and an appeal directed to Representative Lowell Stockman seeking further information.

On recommendation of the city airport committee, which met Monday afternoon for study of the permit, no action was taken.

Mayor Ed Ostendorf observed that bills pending in congress "might change the picture overnight" and the council felt its way cautiously in taking any action as pertains to the huge naval installation.

**"School" Held**

The mayor held a little school of instruction last night to acquaint the rest of the boys on the Dolores property which will face the proposed state highway along that route. Some disapproval has been expressed on the handling of lots in this area. The city and county own 10 lots, six are privately owned. Present plans call for the sale of lots 100 by 140 feet, and placing the area in Class 1-A order to create a fine residential section.

This has been the recommendation of the planning commission and the council is now studying the suggestion before taking steps of approval. The mayor suggested that the matter be studied further and the council agreed with him.

Monday night was the time for reading a score or more of licenses and all were approved including the big licenses of the Southern Oregon Amusement company which paid \$1740 for pinball machines and \$1050 for music machines.

# Steel Dispute To Be Talked

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—President Truman said today he still hopes for settlement of the threatened strike of 800,000 CIO steel workers, set for next Monday.

He made the statement at a news conference on the eve of a second White House meeting of two key men in heading off the walkout — CIO President Philip Murray and Benjamin F. Fairless, president of the United States Steel corporation, bellwether of the industry.

Murray and Fairless conferred last Saturday at the executive mansion. Mr. Truman declined to say what counter proposals Fairless had made to the CIO's demand for \$1.56 a day wage increase.
