Two members of the boards of education submitted resignations to their respective boards at a regular meeting held Monday night.

C. S. Elliot, member of Board No. 1, resigned his duties in favor of Howard Barnhisel whose post he filled when Barnhisel went into the armed forces in 1942. Elliot served out that term and was elected to a second term. Barnhisel was named by the board to fill the vacancy. He will serve until the next school election in June, 1946.
