

Bomb Explodes In Buenos Aires Two Hours After 72-Hour Lockout Ends

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 17 (AP)—A bomb exploded at the entrance of the stock exchange today two hours after the end of the 72-hour national lockout by which business leaders protested a military government decree raising wages and granting year-end bonuses.

The exchange, meeting place of the permanent assembly of commerce, industry and production which called the lockout, opened the regular time. A heavy

police detail which guarded the building after the 2 a. m. explosion was withdrawn.

The blast shattered glass windows within a radius of a block. A policeman was slightly injured by flying glass, but he was the only casualty. The explosion was the only reported violence in the capital.

The lockout ended at midnight Sunday and started at last midnight.

Cable Quashed
A taxi driver who said he discharged two men from his cab near the stock exchange shortly before the explosion was being

questioned. The building at the time of the blast had been guarded by two policemen.

At Mar Del Plata, a resort, vacationers refused to play roulette at government-operated tables. Police fired tear gas into the crowd as it left the casino.

Representatives of the Department Stores association had asked Interior Minister Felipe Urdapilleta last night to order extra precautions in order to prevent violence. Urdapilleta promised that all necessary steps would be taken to guarantee order.

The issues on the labor front are these:

1. Labor wants management

to pay the bonus or a month's pay for last year's work together with pay raises of from 10 to 25 per cent ordered by the government at the year's end.

2. Management wants the government to postpone the date for compliance with the decrees for 90 days, or after the national elections scheduled for February 24.
3. Government wants management to comply immediately with its decrees.

The organizers of the 72-hour closure, the permanent assembly of commerce, industry and production, issued a statement saying that the bonuses and wage increases in themselves were not the real stake in their protest.

The statement said the lockout was ordered instead to protest "the increasing tendency to convert the state into the sole fountainhead of union freedom and in substituting the state for private enterprise in industrial and commercial undertakings."

Probe Ordered In Wasco Deal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—The surplus property administration (SPA) has ordered an investigation of a complaint by Wasco county, Oregon, that it failed to get needed road machinery at an SPA sale.

The agency so advised Rep. Stockman (R-Ore.) today. It said also that it would inquire into complaints of Oregon veterans

that they were not given sufficient time in which to claim surplus property they had purchased.

Stockman called the agency's attention to the situation after Wasco county officials had complained to him. They said they had notified SPA representatives they wished to purchase advertised road machinery but received no acknowledgment until one hour after the sale had been held.

Veterans complained they were allowed only 72 hours to remove the property they purchased. They said it generally

Oregon's Mountain Roads Icy

SALEM, Jan. 17 (AP)—Oregon's mountain roads were icy today, while fog hindered traffic on the Pacific highway at Portland, Salem, Roseburg, Grants Pass and Medford, the state highway commission reported today.

Fog also was reported at The Dalles and Coquille.

The daily road report:

Government Camp—Partly overcast, 31 degrees. 48 inches total snow, packed snow and ice throughout district.

Santiam Junction—Clear, 12 degrees. Roads normal, except for light packed snow and some ice which is sanded. Total snow 84 inches at summit, 44 inches at junction.

Odell Lake—Slightly overcast, 15 degrees. Packed snow to milepost 52. 103 inches of snow at summit. One-way traffic at Oak-ridge.

Siskiyou Summit—Fog extends one mile south of Ashland. Highways normal.

Roads Good

Klamath Falls—Roads in good shape. Temperatures 2 degrees at Sun Mountain, 4 at Quartz Mountain, 12 at Greensprings with fog, and 13 at Klamath Falls.

Medford—Highway icy.

Astoria—Roads unchanged.

Meacham—Spots of snow and ice on Old Oregon Trail between mileposts 253 and 269. Total snow 24 inches.

Austin—Packed snow on roads, but well sanded.

Liquor Commission Not To Get Booze

OREGON CITY, Ore., Jan. 17 (AP)—The Oregon state liquor control commission will not get 333 cases of stolen liquor seized by state police in a truck near Millwaukie.

Circuit Judge E. C. Latourette ruled the \$11,000 worth of liquor was the legal property of J. V. Nanny, San Francisco, from whose warehouse it was reported stolen. The truck's drivers and several California men were arrested in the affair.

How to save more with the bulk foods

Cold weather sharpens appetites and calls for hearty meals. Here are some favorite ideas for winter-time meals, using the inexpensive bulk foods—rice, lentils—and macaroni products.

SPLIT PEA OR LENTIL SOUP
It's nice to float sautéed slices of frankfurter on this soup and serve it with hot garlic French bread for a supper main dish. Place 2 cups washed split peas or lentils in a large kettle and add 2 quarts of water, 3 or 4 stalks of celery, 2 carrots, 1 medium-size onion, a bay leaf, and salt and pepper. If you have it, add the bone left from a roast, a few slices of salt pork or bits of bacon sautéed until brown, or a couple of tablespoons of meat dripping. Boil rapidly for 20 minutes and then simmer slowly about 2 hours, or until peas are soft and tender. Add more water if necessary. Serve 6 to 8.

DEVILED MACARONI OR NOODLES
To make an unusual accompaniment for meat loaf or pot roast, season about 3 cups steaming hot macaroni or noodles with 1 to 2 tablespoons prepared mustard, a dash or two of Worcestershire sauce, 1/4 cup grated sharp cheese, and butter or margarine. Sometimes a couple of tablespoons of chopped onion may be added.

HOW TO USE LEFT-OVER RICE
Rice is so easy to keep and so convenient to have on hand that it's a good idea to cook plenty extra. Just store it in a covered container in the refrigerator. Here are some favorite ways with leftover rice—

RICE CAKES—To each cup of cooked rice add 1 slightly beaten egg. Mix well. Drop by spoonfuls in hot shortening in a frying pan. Brown slowly, turning once. Serve hot, plain or with syrup.

RICE WAFFLES OR MUFFINS
—Substitute cold, cooked rice for 1/4 the flour in your favorite waffle or muffin recipe. Bake as usual.

ADD cooked rice to soup, stuffing, or make it into rice pudding.
