

Protestant Churches Face Golden Opportunity, Says Rev. Lampe In Talk Here

"The golden opportunity of the age is before Protestant churches today." This statement was emphatically made by the Rev. Mr. William B. Lampe, D. D., moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States at a dinner meeting Wednesday.

The speaker was introduced by the Rev. Hugh T. Mitchell, pastor of Peace Memorial Altamont Presbyterian church, to over 100 persons including Presbyterian ministers and other clergy from the city and county.

Phil Hitchcock, church elder, was presiding officer at the meeting.

"The world is looking toward the United States of America with wistful longing today because they want what we have," Dr. Lampe, top man in the church assembly, said. "They want the American way of living, and our conception of liberty propagated through our Christian ideals is the heart of that way of living."

"The Christian, self-disciplined liberty has developed the sane, solid government of the United States and the American way of living which all nations envy today. The core of this way is the disciplined life, only possible through the protestant conception of the re-birth of Christ in the heart of man."

Liberty Available

"Liberty is available to all, through the gospel and it is the tremendous task of the church to show this picture to everyone."

"The churches are so often involved in the good of the community, public works and buildings, that they overlook the greater world-wide plans," Dr. Lampe pointed out. "America lost a golden opportunity for Christianizing Japan in the years 1890-1895, when Japan was crying out for missionaries and has paid dearly and enormously since. Such an opportunity is before us now and if we fail in our obligation now responsibility for future crimes of the world will be ours."

The Rev. Mr. Frederick C. Wissenbach of St. Paul's Episcopal church dismissed the assembly with prayer.

Other churches represented by their pastors were the Bible Baptist, Church of the Nazarene and Congregational.
