Rassling Profit

Last year's rassling shows poured some \$1200 into the coffers of the various ex-service-men's organizations around town and added another \$800 or so to the city treasury.

The boxing commission turned over six per cent of the year's gross take to the city Wednesday night, a total of \$2008.35. Of that sum the city gets 40 per cent and the other 60 per cent is divided among the various organizations on a basis of membership.

That six per cent is of the gross gate receipts of all boxing and rassling events held in town, meaning the bouts held in the armory every Friday last year, or six cents out of every dollar taken in and before any expenses are taken out. It is also exclusive of the rent on the armory.

Mack Lillard was again chosen to promote the fights for the coming year by the boxing commission. He's been at it for a long time and has the necessary contacts to arrange a weekly card that only years of connection with the game can bring.

Sometimes it's a hard matter to get the coast's top-flight muscles here, what with the bright lights and crisp money of Hollywood keeping them lured down there, and Mack sometimes has to dig deep to arrange a bout the fans want.

For instance, the five hundred bucks he had to guarantee Rough Rufus Jones for six rounds with the Grey Mask.

Minor Angling Law Changes Made

Angling regulations for 1946, as tentatively set by the state game commission last week, will not be adopted finally until January 26, giving time for fishermen and game organizations to register any objections with the commission.

General season for trout six inches or over in length will be from April 20 to October 31, except in Lake county where the season will open May 20, one month later, and in Harney county where the opening date is set for May 4.

The bag limit remains the same as last year—15 fish or 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, but not to exceed 30 fish or 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days.

Black bass may hereafter be taken all year around except in Klamath county waters which will be closed during May and June to such fishing. The eight-inch length minimum on black bass is removed. The bag limit on perch is removed this year.

Davis lake, north of Diamond lake in Klamath county, will be open for fishing from May 30 to September 1. Other regulations for the county remain the same as last year.

Closed to all angling are Klamath river for a distance of 4000 feet below and 2000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek, Spencer creek itself, Odell creek from the lake downstream to a point where telephone lines cross the creek near the forestry camp, and that part of Link river from the Copco dam to 200 feet below the dam.

General angling season in Lake county is from May 20 to October 31. Open season from April 20 to October 31 holds for Ana river, Drews creek up to the first railroad bridge above the highway, Dog creek below Dog lake, Dry creek, Honey creek below the water gauge at the

mouth of the canyon, Thompson valley reservoir, Thomas creek up to the north fence of the Lakeview-Klamath Falls highway, and Hart lake.

Closed to all angling are Deadhorse lake and the upper reaches of these streams: Buck creek, Bridge creek, Walker creek, School creek, Gearhart creek, north fork Sprague river, Bear creek, Sycan creek, Coffeepot creek, Drews creek, Whitworth creek, Deep creek, Crooked creek, Porcupine creek, Guyer creek, Camp creek, August creek, Bauers creek, Cottonwood creek and Dairy creek, all in Lake county.

In Jackson county the open season at Squaw lakes runs from April 20 to October 31, and Fish lake is open from April 20 to August 15. Bag limit, 10 pounds and one fish or not more than 10 fish.

The general season holds on Deschutes river except that in the portion of the river between Wickiup dam to Sheep bridge the season opens May 1. Other regulations for Deschutes county set the following seasons:

Davis lake, same as Klamath county; South Twin lake, June 29 to August 31, North Twin lake, June 29 to September 30. Bag limit in Deschutes river from the dam to the bridge will be 10 fish or 15 pounds and one fish, for East lake five fish or 15 pounds and one fish and a special closure on part of Sparks lake was passed.

In Douglas county the season runs from June 8 to September 30 at Diamond, Fish, Buckeye and Cliff lakes and Fish Lane creek. Loon lake is opened to angling during general seasons.

All tributaries of North and South Umpqua rivers and the main Umpqua river east of highway 99 closed from October 31 to April 15. North and South Umpqua rivers and tributaries closed to Chinook salmon fishing from July 15 to January 1.

Rita has been active on Los Angeles and other southern mats for several months while Clara has been generally devoting her talents to northern circles, so the Klamath Falls bout is a central meeting-ground for the two.

Miss Martinez is probably the top seeded challenger today for the title claimed by Clara and Miss Burke.

Also on Tuesday's card Pete Belcastro will crawl into the ring with Joe Lynam in a six-round top event, Brutal Jack Lipscomb and Leo Mortensen have the four-round semi-final and Herbie Parks and Bulldog Jackson get together in the three-canto opener.
