Interesting news in this mainline railroad town that the good old S.P. is going to make that long-talked bid for postwar passenger business with Portland-San Francisco streamliners, via Klamath Falls.

Official word is that it is hoped to have the new streamliners, the Shasta Daylights, running through here by the end of the year. The S.P. also plans to streamline progressively the presently operating Cascades, with new cars for that purpose slated to arrive early in 1947.

The plan is to operate the Shasta Daylights on a day-time basis, leaving Portland and San Francisco in the mornings and arriving at their destinations in the evenings. That, presumably, means the speedsters will pass through here sometime around midday, affording afternoon and evening trips to the cities north and south, and morning homecomings to Klamath Falls.

No running time has been announced, but our information is that about 15 hours is planned for the trip from Portland to San Francisco.

The Southern Pacific's success in maintaining a heavy volume of passenger business is of no small importance to Klamath Falls, which has, in its railroad business, an economic factor that is not always recognized for its full value. If the railroad is going to compete with private automobiles and other forms of public transportation in the passenger field, it will require progressive action such as is now planned for the Portland-San Francisco run.

Democratic Failures

The World Today

MADRID, Jan. 22—The question of whether the Spanish monarchy shall be restored remains hot though unanswered, but your columnist team has been sleuthing about and is at least able to report that Spain is equipped to house a king—if that's the sort of government the country wants.

The Royal Palace was thrown open to Mrs. Mack and me and after walking for hours through a labyrinthine fairland, we are quite prepared to accept the claim that this is the world's finest establishment of its kind. I've seen many European and Oriental palaces—been a guest in some of 'em for that matter—and can find no fault with the claim that the Madrid palace outshines them all.

Anyway, who am I to argue against the great Napoleon Bonaparte, who remarked to his brother, Joseph, on installing him in the Spanish capital as king: "You will be better housed than I am at the Tuileries."

As to whether the pretender Don Juan ever will occupy the home of his ancestors again, it strikes me we shall be wise not to rush to any conclusion. The matter is certainly being discussed widely, but it must be recognized that no great political change can be made by waving a magic wand—especially with Europe in a highly nervous and, in many places, highly disorganized state.

If a return of the monarchy is contemplated in official quarters—and there has been no indication in this matter—we may be fairly sure that the change would be made with greatest care and deliberation. Anyway, the mountainous palace, though slightly damaged during the Civil war, is in large measure still its royal self.

The private quarters of the family, to be sure, have been stripped of furniture in some cases, and haven't been kept up for display. But the great state rooms glitter with the splendor of 15 years ago, when the late King Alfonso went into exile with his family.

There is no speck of dust visible on the priceless furniture, the massive cut glass chandeliers and the paintings of masters, for faithful hands which served the old monarchy still perform the prideful tasks.

Maybe Mrs. Mack and I are over-fanciful, but we speculated whether Don Juan might find a good omen in that 10-foot tall clock beside the dais in the throne room. This old timepiece tells the seconds, minutes, hours, days and months and is keeping its record just as it was when Alfonso bade farewell to his palace.

Is it marking the time until the return of the heir to the throne?

Sky Review Pleasurable Study, Says Astronomer

Should the curtain of cloud soon evening soon roll itself up into nothingness and allow the infinitudes of the great spaces to reveal themselves to earth-dwellers, why not spend a few minutes under the open sky and try to name the brighter stars? This is very easily done, and often starts a most pleasurable study which endures throughout a lifetime.

Let us observe around 6 p. m. Somewhat north of east we find a splendid curve of four bright stars. Counting from the highest down, there are Castor, Pollux, Mars (the finest of all) and Saturn. The last two are planets. South of east, a striking group of stars outlines the hunter's belt. Bright red Betelgeuse to the left in his shoulder and steel-white Rigel to the right shines in his shoe buckle.

Within an hour or two, the dog-star, Sirius, the brightest of all fixed stars in the sky, will be glittering low in the southwest. Procyon in the Little Dog will appear almost due east even earlier than Sirius.

Aldebaran Shines Almost in line with Orion and the zenith—and high in the sky—orange Aldebaran shines among the little stars of the V-shaped Hyades cluster. The V lies on its side with the point toward the south. Still higher, the tiny dipper of the Pleiades, made up of six little stars, usually attracts instant attention.

Now look high in the eastern sky, a little north of due east, for the bright yellow Capella, the principal star in the Chariot.

Turning our gaze toward the southwest, we find near the horizon blue-white Fomalhaut in the Southern Fish. Fairly low in the west, Altair will soon be setting. In the northwest, brilliant Vega is scintillating as the principal ornament in the Harp of Orpheus, while considerably above and to the south, Deneb, less luminous but conspicuous, stands at the top of the large figure of the Northern Cross.

Be sure to look for our familiar Big Dipper. Early this evening it is right-side up and not high above the northern horizon.
