

# Dean Leighton Praises Klamath Health Program

Dr. R. W. Leighton, dean of the school of physical education, University of Oregon, and Mrs. George R. K. Moorhead, University of Oregon school of medicine, spoke last night at a meeting of principals and coaches held in the Winema hotel dining room.

Dean Leighton discussed the Oregon health and physical fitness program and paid tribute to the reception which the program had been given in Klamath Falls which, the dean observed,

has always had an exceptionally fine physical education plan in its schools.

"This Oregon program," the dean observed in speaking to the association, "has a single objective purpose, making it possible for all youngsters to grow straight, strong and to keep them active and vigorous."

**Reaction**

Mrs. Moorhead, who returned recently from a tour of the east, told the gathering of the reaction to the Oregon program among leaders of education in that part of the country. She spoke at the University of North Carolina in response to a request sent her late last year in the interest of the Oregon program.

"The North Carolina people were amazed that any state had progressed as far as Oregon has in such a program. Throughout the east there was great approval of our concept of the program," Mrs. Moorhead said.

Other states in the union, especially Connecticut, and also New York and Kentucky are keenly interested in the physical fitness program which had its inception in Oregon.

Both Dean Leighton and Mrs. Moorhead spent Monday afternoon at the Marine Barracks as guests of Col. Charles T. Brooks. They inspected various physical education features of the barracks and Dean Leighton was especially interested in the swimming pool. He paid tribute to Lt. McNamara, in charge of swimming at the barracks pool, whom the dean said was considered one of the five top coaches in the United States. Lt. McNamara is on leave from MIT, Boston, where he will return as coach.

# Hillman Lauds Truman Stand

NEW YORK, Jan. 22 (AP)—Sidney Hillman, chairman of the CIO political action committee, sent President Truman a message last night congratulating him on his labor program and

his efforts to avert the nationwide steel strike.

Hillman also assured the president of the PAC's "fullest support of the firm stand you have taken in favor of wage increases to protect American workers against a drastic decline in living standards and to maintain the national purchasing power essential to a healthy economy."

The message also said the PAC was "particularly appreciative of your patient and constructive effort to effect a settlement" in the steel controversy, and added:

"The refusal of the steel companies to accept your eminently fair and reasonable proposal fully demonstrates that they are placing their own selfish interests ahead of the national welfare."

# Kerr Says Jap Had Fair Trial

PORTLAND, Jan. 22 (AP)—Major Robert M. Kerr, chief prosecutor in the war criminal trial of Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, was here today visiting his family while awaiting the supreme court decision on the Yamashita case.

Kerr said the decision on Yamashita's contention he should have been tried in civil court could establish, for the first time, the right to try war criminals before military tribunals.

Kerr, son of the former Oregon State college president, told interviewers the former Japanese commander in the Philippines "had a very thorough and fair trial." We reached the conclusion that Yamashita was responsible for a deliberate campaign of extermination, terrorism and devastation."

# Lost Wallet Found On Dead Japanese

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Jan. 22 (AP)—Howard S. Sears lost his wallet, containing \$60 and a state liquor license, while at the coast guard training school, Pacific Beach, Wash., back in July, 1943.

Recently he received the billfold from Seattle coast guard headquarters. Enclosed was a note saying: "Wallet found on dead Jap on Salpan."

The \$60 was missing.
