Klamathites Urged To Aid Garment Drive

America is still far short of the 100 million garments needed for the victory clothing drive now in progress, according to Don Everitt, general chairman of the drive in Klamath county sponsored by American Legion post No. 8. Everitt advises that the following business houses have donated space for clothing contributions and everyone is urged to bring in their bundles by January 31. Leave them at Balsiger Motors, front entrance, Moe's, Sears Roebuck, J. C. Penney, Lombard Motors, Montgomery Ward and Trulove's Market or the Eastside Grocery on East Main.

Members of the Legion will then make collections from these various points and arrange to bale the clothes at the main collection point, the Drake Lumber company warehouse. All contributions are reminded to tie shoes in pairs as it is almost impossible to match them up from the huge pile already accumulated.

The climax of the drive will feature distribution of \$200 in prize money among the various city and county schools, according to amount of clothing gathered by each school. Presentation of the checks will be made by Paul Otterbein, commander of post No. 8, to Arnold Gralapp, city superintendent and Fred Peterson, county school superintendent.
