

Dennis Gets Second Stay Of Execution

SALEM, Jan. 23 (AP)—Andrew Dennis, 45-year-old Portland mother-in-law slayer who was scheduled to die in the state prison's gas chamber next Friday morning, was saved for the second time today when Governor Earl Snell granted him a reprieve of one week.

The governor said "There are some phases of this case concerning which I desire additional information."

Dennis originally was scheduled to die last November 15, Acting Gov. Howard C. Belton having denied him clemency. But the night before the scheduled execution, the state supreme court found that no death warrant existed and ordered Dennis back to Portland for resentencing. This move gave Dennis time to make an appeal to Governor Snell, who was out of the state at the time the execution was originally scheduled.

Dennis claims he is innocent and that he was convicted only on circumstantial evidence. He also claims he did not have a fair trial, being supported in his stand by Circuit Judge Martin W. Hawkins, who presided at his trial; Circuit Judge James R. Bain, who was district attorney at the time, and Thomas R. Handley, present Multnomah county district attorney.

Council Votes New Officers

Ralph W. Waggoner, plant manager of the Klamath Falls crematory, was elected chairman of the Klamath Falls apprenticeship council at the group's regular meeting this week. Ralph Howard is the retiring chairman, having served in the local council four years. Robert P. Craig was named secretary.

Craig, new trades and industrial coordinator for Klamath schools, succeeds H. A. Teale who is now vocational director for this area. Employer member S. R. Brown and his alternate, R. E. Hooker, were elected to the council for one year. F. W. Eberlein and his alternate, Ray Byrnes, for two years. Employee members R. W. Waggoner and Earl Godding for one year, Zeno Dent and Pat Kilby for two years. Ex-officio members are A. L. Gralapp, Stanley Woodruff and Paul Angstead.

Plumbing standards for apprentices and veterans prepared by the plumbers union and the master plumbers was submitted and approved. Apprenticeship councils in the state have authority to approve wages and agreements for the trades and industries in their respective areas where apprentices and veterans are concerned.

The council approved organization of a subcommittee to act on apprenticeship application and agreements between regular meetings in order to further expedite the work and to accommodate returning veterans interested in apprenticeship.

The apprenticeship indenture of James McFarland Jr. to Ward's Klamath funeral home was approved. Appointment of John Childers, Llewellyn Gehring, Arlo Schultz, Dean Matlick, Roger Rose, as grocery clerks; Kenneth Baker to Lorenz company, Dennis B. Knowles to Great Northern railroad, and Richard Boettcher to Pacific Fruit Express on vocational training memorandums were also approved.

Rakestraw Explains Use Of Polio Fund Donations

In how many ways are contributions to the March of Dimes used for the aid of infantile paralysis sufferers? This question was answered by R. D. Rakestraw, treasurer of the Klamath chapter of the National Foundation.

"All the money contributed to the March of Dimes is divided into two parts," he explained. "Half remains in the county where it is subscribed, to provide direct aid to polio patients. It is used by the county chapter for medical and nursing care, hospitalization, physical therapy treatments, orthopedic surgery, if necessary, orthopedic equipment and appliances, and all other services necessary to the complete care of paralysis patients."

"The other half goes to headquarters of the National Foundation for emergency aid in epidemics, for training professional personnel in care and treatment methods, for education and the vital program of scientific research which is our only hope of finally wiping out this dread disease."

"This intensive fight against infantile paralysis is undoubtedly the greatest voluntary humanitarian movement in the recorded history of mankind. It exists only by and through your continuing support."

Medford Man Earns Medal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Charles H. Gerhardt, Medford, Ore., has been awarded the distinguished service medal for his part in commanding the 29th infantry division in Europe, the war department announced today.

The 29th hit French beaches with the first wave on D-Day, fought through the "tangled hedgerows of the Normandy peninsula" and captured St. Lo and Vire before driving south and then west in the assault on Brest, the citation stated.

Later the division crossed the Roer river despite floodwaters and enemy opposition and seized three important German centers, over-ran extensive territory and captured many prisoners.

Homes To Head Service Club

The Merrill fire department, co-sponsor of the 1945 festival, turned over to the club approximately \$1600 and of this amount \$1000 will be used as a retaining fund for this year's two-day show. The club has an \$1100 fund, a part of which will be used to further several community projects which the organization has in view.

Virgil Hayes of the farm employment service has agreed to serve as scoutmaster for a Merrill Boy Scout troop which is being reorganized. He will be assisted by Tom Barry and O. V. Reeves. A financial estimate will be presented to the club for consideration.

The Service club voted to increase annual dues to \$3.


