

UNO Votes Unanimously To Create Special Atomic Energy Commission

LONDON, Jan. 24 (AP)—The United Nations general assembly voted unanimously today for the creation of a special atomic energy commission, urged by U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes as necessary to save the world from an atomic armaments race.

The action came after little more than an hour of discussion during which both Byrnes and Chief Soviet Delegate Andrei Vishinsky urged prompt action.

The vote was 47 to 0, with four nations abstaining.

A most simultaneous world security council announced that it would meet tomorrow to consider complaints involving Iran, Greece and Indonesia.

The complaints, providing the basis for the first major tests of the UNO's machinery to settle disputes, will be considered at 3 p. m. (10 a. m. EST).

Byrnes To Leave

Byrnes, who came to the UNO meeting primarily to work on creation of the atomic commission, planned to leave within a matter of hours—probably today and certainly tomorrow, American officials said.

The commission would have no power to compel the United States or any other country to disclose any of its atomic energy production secrets or disclose how the atom bomb is made, according to interpretations given by Byrnes. Its responsibility will be to work out ways of keeping atomic energy from being used destructively.

It will be composed of representatives of the 11 nations on the security council and Canada, and will be responsible to the council for its work and policies.

Duckworth Barker, UNO public relations officer, in announcing that the security council would take up the Iranian, Greek and Indonesian issues tomorrow, said the council would not act at that time on the question of selecting a nominee for the key post of UNO secretary-general, an issue on which the five major powers apparently were deadlocked.

The council will be asked formally what it wants to do about the Russian and Ukrainian communications drawing attention to the presence of British troops in Greece and Indonesia," Barker said.

He said the council would be asked by Chairman Norman J. O. Makin of Australia along what lines it should proceed with the Soviet charges against Britain.

The same question, Barker stated, would be asked about Iran's charges that Russia was interfering in Iranian internal affairs.

The official British attitude is that a UNO investigation into the Greek situation would be welcomed, but British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin was understood to hold the view that no inquiry into the Indonesian situation should be held now.

The British contend that a state of war still exists in Java and that Britain was asked by the combined chiefs of staff in Washington to send troops into Indonesia to clean up the Japanese and maintain order. They maintain that an investigation now would be opportune.

Question Action

In Athens 10 Greek political parties, in a joint statement, questioned Russia's action in placing before the United Nations the matter of British troops in Greece. They expressed "surprise because the question of the withdrawal of British troops was raised without Greece's cognizance."

Shortly before the assembly Byrnes told reporters that he had not been urging the security council to delay consideration of the complaints brought to it by Iran against Russia and by Britain against the British in Greece and Indonesia.

Most of the London press has been reporting for two days that Byrnes was bringing pressure for delay, that Russia was supporting his view and that the British foreign secretary, Ernest Bevin, was fighting to win immediate action.

Byrnes said today he had never expressed any such view to any individual and that the subject had never come up in any meeting of the representatives of the five principal powers.

Other officials said Byrnes had told Bevin the sooner the cases come before the council the better.

River May Be Rerouted To Avoid Slides

As considered as a possible way to avoid further landslides such as those which recently impaired rail travel north of Dunsmuir, Southern Pacific officials are negotiating for the purchase of land near Upper Soda Springs at Dunsmuir onto which they may move the Sacramento river as well as moving the roadbed away from the danger area at the base of the hillside which has been sliding.

The river has been filled in on the side adjacent to the railroad tracks and rock has been dumped along the bank forcing the water to the opposite side. The worst slides occurred on December 28 and January 2 and resulted in a complete tie-up of rail traffic.

The track has been moved a few feet away from the foot of the hill, but railroad officials want more land so that there will be no future danger of slides.

One tract of land under consideration is owned by the California Oregon Power company and another is known as the Masson meadow.
